MRS. JOSEPH WRY.  
SACKVILLE, June 28.—The death of Mrs. Joseph Wry occurred on Wednesday evening, June 28, at her residence. Her death was not unexpected, as she had been in failing health for some time. A husband and three sons survive. Funeral will be held this afternoon. Rev. J. L. Dawson will officiate.

**HAZEKIAH PORTER.**  
The death took place yesterday of Hazekeh Porter of paralysis. The deceased was a native of St. Andrews, where he served as a boy at sea for four years. Early in life, however, he came to St. John, and was here employed in some of the prominent dry goods establishments until he entered into business with J. Eagles under the firm name of Eagles & Porter. For a number of years he has been employed in the freight department of the I. C. R. He is survived by his wife and one son, Walter K. Porter, as well as two sisters, Mrs. John Porter of Mattian, N.S., and Miss Martha, who resides in Massachusetts.

There has been a rumor around the city lately that the tariff fire insurance companies are likely to reduce their rates immediately and not wait the installing of the new distribution service which is not likely to be concluded for some months.
