CITY WILL SECURE

FLOATING ELEVATOR

(Continued from Page One.)

Mr. Pugsley said that he had asked for the meeting in order to ask the advice of the council regarding certain matters. Some time ago representations were made to him by the Allan Line to the effect that they would be put to serious inconvenience this winter if the grain conveyors were not extended to the new wharves, especially in view of the large grain trade expected this winter. After consultation with the mayor he corresponded with the C. P. R. to see if they would undertake the construction and asked for an estimate of the cost. The rough estimate furnished by the railway was \$90,000. Taking up the matter with the government he represented that neither the railway nor the city wore willing to undertake the construction and received authority to build the conveyors at the expense of his lepartment at a cost of not more than \$90,000.

On Sept. 1st he received a wire from D. McNicol, vice-president of the C. P. R. stating that a careful estimate showed that the cost of double elevators would be about \$145,000. This included the cost of motors as the present elevator power is not sufficient for the added work. A single conveyor would cost about \$23,000 less. He stated that the work could not be finished much before February and suggested that

the work could not be finished much before February and suggested that a floating elevator should be provided to handle this winter's business.

Regarding this the minister said that St. John with the court of the elevator might. WINDSOR, Sept. 2—Police Magistrate Bartlett this morning sentenced Nathaniel Self, alias George Ferguson, of London, to serve five years in Kingston Penitentiary for bigamy.
