EXPRESS CAR STRIKES AUTO AT FULL SPEED

One Dying and Four Badly Hurt—Widow of Famous Botanist Dead—Drunk Causes Suicide.

BOSTON, Mass., July 29.—A special from Onset, Mass., tonight, states that Mrs. Lincoln Washburn, wife of Judge Washburn of the district court of Middleboro and Wareham, is lying and four others were badly hurt as the result of an automobile, in which they were riding, being struck and demolished by an express car on the Quonset Street Railway late today.

The express car was coming down a steep hill at a high speed, according to the report, and hit the automobile as it was backing onto the track.

Mrs. Washburn suffered concussion of the brain, while minor injuries were sustained by Mrs. David Fitchman, sister of Mrs. Washburn; Harry Woods, William Andrews and Kendrick Washburn, son of Judge Washburn, who was celebrating his 16th birthday by acting as chauffeur for the party.

All resided in Middleboro. BOSTON, Mass., July 29.—Mrs. Jane L. GABINET CRISIS ENDS IN THE RESIGNATION OF ALL CUBA'S MINISTERS

Action Taken After Conference to Show Loyalty to President by Relieving Him of Embarrassment of Removing Them.

HAVANA, July 29.—The cabinet crisis which for some time has been impending reached a climax this afternoon when all the ministers, as well as the presidential secretary, General Castellanos, signed their resignations, which will be officially presented to President Gomez on his arrival tomorrow from Cayo Cristo.

The action of the cabinet was taken after a conference with the avowed purpose of expressing loyalty to the president and relieving him of the embarrassment of making removals.
