Miss Fritz Makes New Speed Record

Champion Typist Gives Marvellous Exhibition Before Large Audience — 400 Words From Text Book in 3 Min. 1 Sec. — Underwood's Vice President Gives St. John Girls Some Good Advice — Reception Afterwards.

Miss Rose L. Fritz, the champion typist, broke a record at the exhibition of speed writing given in Keith's Assembly rooms last evening. Also she broke the hearts of all the typists in town, and perhaps of a number of prominent business men, who attended the performance in order to see whether their typists were up to the standard.

"It was wonderful," was the verdict of one of St. John's fair typewriter girls. "She makes me feel like two cents."

Miss Fritz is certainly an ideal typist. She can pound the keys at the rate of a flirtation or add up rows of figures at the same time. Probably she could chew gum, and run with the office boy as well. And in addition to her accomplishments, she has good looks—large blue eyes, pink and white coloring, a wealth of golden hair—and would be an ornamental feature in any office. Miss Fritz can come to work in this office as soon as she likes.

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Then the performance began. Miss Fritz's nimble fingers flashed like lightning over the keys, and rattled off from dictation 156 words to the minute. Blindfolded she did nearly as well. Then she pounded off over 140 words a minute reading from copy while at the same time she carried on a conversation with J. G. Harrison, secretary of W. H. Thorne and Co. Next she wrote from copy at an amazing rate, while she added up 5 columns of figures 5 deep, chalked up on

a blackboard by S. Kerr, and called off to her as her fingers glittered over the keys. Then she wrote from a text book handed her by Mr. Kerr 400 words in 3 minutes and 1 second—making so Mr. Seitz remarked a record for that class of work. Then she wrote 254 short words in a minute, moving the carriage twelve times during the exercise.

Mr. Seitz Gives Some Advice.
At the close Mr. Seitz delivered an oration to the young ladies present. "Girls," said he, "it's up to you to make St. John a city of a quarter of a million in a short time. Miss Fritz and I have travelled all over Canada, and I want to tell you that you've got a city of great possibilities right here. The west hasn't got anything that you don't have, except the western spirit and that is made by the young men from the east."

"St. John would soon be a great city if the young men stayed here, and did a little business. It's up to you girls to get hold of the young men and keep them here. Take them by the coat collar, lead them up to the altar, and then make them brush up and hustle for the good of the city. That's the message I've come here to deliver, and if you take my advice, and hold on to the young men, you'll soon have a flourishing city, and be able to abandon the typewriter and start manipulating a coffee pot in your own home." (Tremendous applause.)

After this speech, Miss Fritz held a reception and told all the young ladies who could get near her how she achieved the championship.

S. Kerr, of the business college, held the stop watch during the performance and the U. P. Cowgill, local manager of the Underwood Company, counted the words as they fell—rather slow—from the nimble fingers of the champion. None of the local typists appeared to be anxious to contest the champion's title, but they vigorously applauded her performance. Many, however, went away from the exhibition with a rather doleful look, as if they expected the boss would be looking to them to follow the pace set by the champion.

SHRUBB IS AFTER QUEAL IN EARNEST

Boston, May 17.—Billy Queal, the American long-distance champion, and Al Shrubbs, the British long-distance runner, will meet in a special 12-mile race at the Boston American league grounds on the evening of May 24.

After the sensational race that the two put up at 10 miles Saturday at Pittsfield, both runners decided to meet over the 12-mile journey for a side bet of \$250.

With Shrubbs and Queal meeting at this distance it brings together the two most famous champions in the long-distance running game. The two champions have met over the 10-mile route on different occasions, the American defeating the Britisher by close margins. Shrubbs, however, figures the route is a little short for him and that the decision will be reversed at the longer distance.

The American league grounds will be expected to be lighted for the contest and the race will be seen as well as in the daytime. A special five-mile open race will be an added attraction in which many of the local lights will compete.

A SUFFRAGETTE EJECTED FROM GERMAN REICHSTAG

Berlin, May 17.—The deliberations of the German Reichstag were interrupted today by a scene similar to those witnessed in the British Parliament when the militant suffragettes disturbed the proceedings of the House of Commons. A woman in the gallery attempted to make a motion protesting against the inaudibility of the debate on the floors of the Reichstag. The officials were unable to quiet the woman, and she was forcibly removed from the gallery. The chamber resounded with her hysterical shrieking.

THE OLIVER CHARGES.

Ottawa, May 17.—Mr. Clark, of Essex, was today chosen chairman of the special committee to investigate the charges against Hon. Frank Oliver. The committee, the other members of which are Messrs. Carvell, Geoffrey, McEwen and O'Rourke, held a brief sitting and adjourned till tomorrow.

Council Meets This Morning.

A requisition for a special meeting of the council to reconsider the question of buying the ferry boat Newport was presented to the mayor yesterday and he decided to call the meeting at 11:30 this morning. The requisition was signed by the eleven aldermen who voted in favor of purchasing the boat the other day and by Ald. Scully who was not present at the recent meeting. This means that unless something unexpected happens there will be twelve members of the council who will vote to purchase the boat at the meeting of this morning, and that as twelve members constitute two-thirds of the council a motion to buy the Newport will carry by the necessary legal majority.

WORKING ON THE MEXICAN PEACE TERMS

Madero And His Cabinet Gathered At Juarez Yesterday To Formulate a Final Peace Agreement.

Juarez, Mex., May 17.—In response to a request from the Mexican government, Provisional President Francisco I. Madero, Jr., and his cabinet, gathered at 11 o'clock today to formulate a final peace agreement which is to be submitted by telegram to Judge Carbajal today to President Diaz and his cabinet.

A change in the procedure of the negotiations has been made, but it will hasten rather than delay the ratification of peace in Mexico. At first it was thought as soon as an agreement was reached on the principal basis, the naming of three cabinet portfolios and fourteen governorships, an armistice for the entire country would be proclaimed. There is practically a mutual acceptance now of the principal points, but instead of a point by point ratification it has been decided to have the rebels submit their programme in full for blanket ratification by the government.

The ratification will be concurrent with the announcement of an armistice. The signing in Juarez of the agreement itself, in a few days by Judge Carbajal and the representatives whom the insurgents may name will end the armistice and a normal peace will be recognized as existent.

The insurgents here will telegraph or send couriers to their principal points, but instead of a public and it is believed that within a week all arms will have been laid down in the republic.

JEFF'S WIFE PUTS HIS BIG CAR ON ICE

Big Jim Jeffries may tour Europe with a light heart, for as usual his businesslike little wife has left things in good shape at home and it will be a bold, bad man, and a resourceful one, who breaks into the strong boxes of the former champion.

So carefully has Mrs. Jeff looked after her husband's interests that she has even placed his big automobile in cold storage, and thereby hangs a tale.

When it was definitely decided that Jeffries was to make the European trip there were many solicitous offers from would-be friends to care for the big car, and generous were the offers from all, even from Brother Jack.

Jeffries, as usual, gave no definite answer to the importunate ones, and that settled the business, for when he went home to his wife and mentioned the incident, she remarked, briskly: "Well, we'll see about that."

Consequently the big car is hidden away back in a Los Angeles garage, the chassis is jacked up on stilts, the wheels are locked in a closet, the tires are home in Jeff's house, and the movable parts of the engine are nested away in some safe-deposit box.

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MONTREAL ELEVATORS FILLED WITH GRAIN

Montreal, May 17.—Twenty steamers with cargoes aggregating nearly a million bushels of wheat, are unable to unload their cargoes owing to the fact that every elevator is already bursting with the golden grain. Not a chamber is vacant in the whole harbor despite all the improvements and additions.

STORMS IN JAMAICA CAUSE MUCH DAMAGE

Kingston, Ja., May 17.—A heavy gale has been prevailing here for the last 24 hours. It has been very severe in north side of the island, where a large number of banana trees were destroyed and there was much damage to local shipping.
