PROVINCE WELLS FIEL FOR SHEEP

Col H. M. Campbell Says Sheep Raising Industry Could be Well Carried on in New Brunswick.

That the efforts of the government to awaken interest in the possibilities of sheep raising in the province are likely to have good results, is the opinion of Col. H. M. Campbell, of Campbell, of Apohaqui, who was at the Royal yesterday. Col. Campbell was a member of the government commission which recently made a tour of the province for the purpose of interesting the farmers sheep raising and arranging for the distribution of a considerable number of pure bred sheep adapted to conditions in various districts.

AGREEMENT BASIS NOW ARRIVED AT

The company's representatives will have a formal agreement drafted embodying the arrangements agreed on yesterday, and this will be presented to the commissioners probably today, for their formal ratification.

Fleming, premier, in an address at a banquet given at the men of St. Stephen's Presbyterian church, last evening by the ladies of the auxiliary society. Premier Fleming declared that it was applicable to every movement, whether it be for bettering conditions in a community or solving national problems.
