Magnificent Programme by the Talented Kendall Trio — Miss Asher and Good Pictures.

A handsome Italian youth and his beautiful cello, a brilliant soprano and a harpiste of rare ability in addition to the fine singing of Gertrude Asher and a superb picture bill, sent away delighted thousands from the Nickel yesterday. 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CASTRO LEADERS, CAPTIVES, PARADED BEFORE GOMEZ

President Gomez demonstrated the strength of the Venezuelan government's military arm when he paraded the entire division stationed at Maracay. A group of twenty political prisoners, who represent the visible residue of the Castro revolution; six thousand infantry, cavalry and mountain howitzers, all well equipped and disciplined, marched from the barracks three miles away, at Tapataya, where the prisoners were taken from Coro.

President Gomez had left the train, purposing by this spectacle to demonstrate to the populace the futility of seditious plots.

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WINNIPEG WAS EASY FOR AUSTRALIANS

Winnipeg, Sept. 1.—Winning by an innings and 58 runs, the Australians round the Winnipeg All-Stars easy, dismissing them in the first innings for 48 runs and in the second for the almost record low score of 8 runs, two of which were singles and four byes.

MacArtney's stellar performance

with the ball was the feature of the day's play, capturing no less than 13 wickets at the small cost of fourteen runs. Crawford also bowled throughout both innings, taking six wickets for 35 runs. Mayne played beautiful cricket for his 58 not out, as did Cody for his 21. Bear and Price were responsible for the ten Australian wickets, each taking five, the former for an average cost of six runs a piece, and the latter for 9.2 each.

During the Winnipeg's second innings when the telegraph board was registering "six wickets for one run" and interest was at its height, the two-tier stand on the west side of the ground, overburdened with excited spectators, collapsed without injury to anyone.

BARREAU-CROSS BOUT DRAW.

Vancouver, B. C., Sept. 1.—Frank Barreau, of Vancouver, former welterweight champion of Canada, went 12 rounds with Leach Cross, of New York, at the Brighouse Arena today, and the fact that the boxers had mutually agreed on a draw if on their feet at the end of the fight saved the American from having a defeat registered against him. The contest went the limit with the Vancouver lad having a shade, and he left the ring without a mark while the New Yorker, who is camping on the trail of Willie Ritchie and Freddie Welsh, climbed out with his mouth badly cut and a left optic black, the result of Bar-

reau's straight left. In summing up Barreau had five rounds, Cross three, while four were even.

AUSTRALIANS VICTORIOUS.

Winnipeg, Sept. 1.—Australians scored a victory over Winnipeg by an innings and 58 runs in low scoring game. Australians 112, and Winnipeg 48 and six.
