WHAT OUR PREMIER SAID IN VANCOUVER

Full Report of Hon. J. K. Flemming's Address on Canadian Unity Before Canadian Club of British Columbian Metropolitan.

The Vancouver News-Advertiser, of Sept. 10th, prints the following report of Hon. J. K. Flemming's address before the Canadian Club of Vancouver:

"We must have a strong Imperial spirit. It is time we recognized that we are out of our swaddling clothes and the time has come when we must take a greater part in the responsibilities of the Empire."

"The man is a poor Canadian who would try to foster the feeling that the east feels any antagonism towards the west, or vice versa, or to spread the belief that there is antagonism between the English speaking and French speaking people of this country."

"What Canada needs is strong men who will help to create and direct a strong national sentiment which will make for national greatness. We want a strong country morally. We must build on moral foundations. I had the idea that in the rush and feverish development of western Canada the higher aspects of life might be ignored."

"The speaker closed with an eloquent reference to the Dominion's duty as a member of the Empire. A vote of thanks was moved by Messrs. John Hendry and J. N. Harvey, the latter a life-long friend of the premier."
