In conclusion, we may observe—

*That the signs of the times are at once encouraging and cautionary.* If we contemplate the unexampled progress of the gospel since the commencement of the nineteenth century, the wide diffusion of general knowledge, the triumphs of the voluntary principle, and the access of evangelical Christians to unite for the promotion of important objects, we cannot but acknowledge that there are so many sources of encouragement. But we must rejoice with trembling." Priestcraft is still strong, and exercises a bewitching influence over the people. Science, though smitten with a deadly wound, is still powerful enough to do much mischief. The rapid progress of Puseyite fooleries is a cutting satire on the wisdom of the age. Even the "first principles of the oracles" are not yet understood by many who stand in the places.

*That it is highly important to inculcate correct and disseminate useful information.* If we were to specify the subjects which ought to be specially taught at the present time, we should mention the authority of Scripture, the doctrine of justification by faith, the spirituality of the kingdom of Christ. Correct teaching on these and kindred topics are of the highest importance. A series of tracts on these subjects, partly doctrinal, and partly historical, would be of great service in the cause of truth.
