EXPECT THE PORT TO BE IMPROVED

DOCKING FACILITIES WOULD MEAN TRANSIT OF HUNDREDS OF THOUSANDS OF TONS OF COAL

OTTAWA, May 13.—The deputation of the Associated Boards of Trade along the L.E.C.N., including Brantford, Simcoe, Paris, Galt, Kitchener, Waterloo and other places, had a one-hour conference with Acting Premier White and Hon. F. B. Carvell, minister of public works, at noon to-day, urging improvements to Port Dover harbor. The meeting was of a rather easy, informal nature.

Secretary Hanebeck, of the deputation, outlined the history of the movement, and asserted that the more the investigation the firmer the conviction that the harbor should have docking facilities for a car ferry. He gave figures showing that such a dock would afford a transit of 373,943 tons annually, of which 265,889 tons would be coal. He emphasized the importance of the district from a manufacturing standpoint, and quoted figures to show that Kitchener alone sent out goods to the value of \$1,800 per capita of population, and claimed that the proposed dock facilities would increase production by lowering freight rates.

John Smart followed, giving a history of the Grand Trunk policy against the development of the Port Dover dock extending over 30 years, and stated that a year ago, through threatening the Kolbe Company, the G.T.R. prevented the bringing of small quantities of coal across the lake to help out in a fuel emergency.

Agreement Needed
The acting premier warned the deputation of the necessity of a binding agreement with the road to prevent its taking advantage of the situation by charging a rate just a little below the present rate by way of Suspension Bridge, in case the dock was built.

In reply to the deputation Mr. Carvell observed that since the armistice had been signed demands for public works had been deluging the department from all points.

"We have a big family and limited means," he remarked. "Our policy is to undertake only such works as will be productive, and, of these, we must give preference to such as will give employment to lines of occupation demanding work." Regarding Port Dover he said that the engineers had outlined two projects, one of dredging in the shore and the other of building out to deep water. The estimated cost given is \$250,000 to \$300,000. The acting premier was advised by Hon. Mr. Carvell that a shallow car ferry might be used, and if this were practicable the proposition would be comparatively inexpensive.

Favors Shallow Ferry.
Capt. Robson was requested to give an opinion on this point, and he said that he always stood for a light draft ferry, and he pointed out that it had been the system used across the North Sea just above the Strait of Dover during the war. Another of the same type was in use at Quebec. An Ontario man had superintended the work overseas, and since returning had given his opinion that a shallow ferry would work in Lake Erie.

"We are not here as Grits and Tories but as plain business men," remarked Mr. Hanebeck in his presentation of the case.

"When did I hear those terms?" humorously interrupted Hon. Mr. White. It is evident that the Minister of Public Works is impressed with the claim. He told the acting premier minister in the presence of the deputation that he did not think there was such a dilapidated piece of work anywhere on earth.

"You have to see it to believe it," was his remark.

During the interview Hon. Mr. Carvell referred to his visit to Port Stanley, suitably citing the day of the week. Altogether the deputation came away satisfied that an impression had been made.

Favorable Impression By Finance Minister.
The delegation from the municipalities in the Grand River Valley which appeared before the Finance Minister yesterday with the request that the harbor at Port Dover be improved this year returned with the impression that their request would be granted. Sir Thomas White, while he gave no statement or promise yet by his interest and questions left the impression he is in sympathy with the proposal.

This is the report of Secretary Payson of the Board of Trade who was the representative from this city on the delegation and who has returned. It is confidently expected that an appropriation for the purpose will be set aside in the estimates this year.

Regarding representatives from this city, Ald. Ratz in Troit Creek this week was expected to attend the meeting in Ottawa. He has not yet returned.

ITALIANS LANDING FORCES.

BORDEN AND SIFTON HAVE LEFT PARIS

WILL IMMEDIATELY SAIL TO CANADA.

PARIS, May 14.—A cable from Leon Trotsky says that in view of the fact that the principles have been settled upon which peace is to be established, Sir Robert Borden and Hon. Arthur Sifton left Paris this morning for London and will proceed to Canada by the first available boat.

Sir George Foster and Mr. Doherty will remain in Paris for the present and it is possible that if the negotiations should be of a prolonged nature they too will return to Canada before the signing of the treaty. In this event the prime minister and Mr. Sifton will doubtless return to their duties in Paris at the end of the present session of parliament.
