CHAPTER I.

FROM THE FIRST SETTLEMENT UNTIL THE DEPARTURE OF THE QUAKERS.

HEN in the month of June, 1749, the warsloop Sphinx sailed up Chebucto Bay, followed by thirteen transports, a wonderful
panorama of wood and water met the eyes of the
mariners and weary emigrants. One month before,
they had left behind them the coast of England, and
the beauty of that dear old land was still fresh
in their memories. Its smiling fields and happy
homesteads held all they loved the best; the new
country was brightened by possibilities alone. We
can well imagine the mingled feelings of hope and
apprehension which must have stirred their hearts as
they entered the harbour which has since become
so familiar and so dear to their descendants.

On that early summer morning, the rocky shore of Sambro, with its rough headlands so often beaten
