ARTS BACCHANALIA SATURDAY TO FEATURE NOTED WRITER

David Walker, novelist, will be the guest speaker at the Arts Bacchanalia on Saturday, February 21

The Bacchanalia will be held at the Kent Inn, starting at 6.30 p.m. It includes a banquet and a social evening, and will be the closing event of Arts Week.

Born in Scotland

Mr. Walker, who at present resides in St. Andrews, N.B., has twice won the Governor-General's Award for fiction.

He was born in Fife, Scotland, in 1911, and was educated at Shrewsbury and Sandhurst.

From 1931 until his retirement in 1947, Mr. Walker served as a member of the Black Watch Regiment.

He was Aid-de Camp to Lord Tweedsmuir, when Governor-General of Canada, in 1938 and 1939. From 1946 to 1947, he served as Comptroller to the Viceroy of India.

Awarded Degree

In 1955, he was awarded an honorary D. Litt. from UNB.

Among Mr. Walker's best known novels are Geordie, 1950; a film in 1958. Digby 1953; and Harry Black, 1956.
