

The only regulations available to guide me in my duties as warden were the Statutory Rules and Orders, 1906, for discipline and regulation of prisons, and the Rules for Military Detention Barracks and Military Prisons, 1911 - both of which are issued by the War Office. Copies of these are kept in the Wardens Office. I produce these two books.

When it was necessary for a prisoner to leave his cell to proceed to the kitchen, bathroom, etc., he was allowed to proceed thus unescorted, but only one prisoner would be allowed out of his cell at a time. I also produce the book recording visits to prisoners and the Warden's Day Book.

Examined by Defending Officer:-

I have never known of any occasion when visitors were shown over the prison premises. I know of no regulation against this, but when taking over from my predecessor - about 1924 - I was informed that the place appropriated for prisoners to interview visitors was the Wardens Office.

As Warden, I keep up the following Journals and records:-

- (a). Visitors book (Recording visits to prisoners)
- (b). Pleasurment book.
- (c). Prison Register.
- (d). Prisoners' property book.
- (e). Visitors Book, kept in signature daily, by visiting orderly, officers, Medical Officer, etc.

The names in the Visitors book (a) are sometimes entered by the warden and sometimes by the visitor themselves.
