London again throws open its doors to you. Its shady streets, its beautiful parks, public buildings, cozy cottages and palatial palaces—all are yours so long as you choose to remain, and the prevailing wish of the Reception Committee, and citizens generally, is that your pleasure in visiting London may be equal to ours in receiving you, that the reunion of 1901 may be the means of renewing many old friendships and forming many new ones, and that the event may fully sustain the enviable reputation already achieved by the "London Old Boys."
