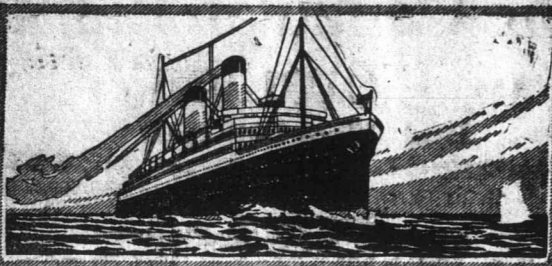

P. E. I. SHIPPING SEASON OPENS WITH USE OF ISLAND RAILWAY.

(Special Correspondence.) Charlottetown, P. E. I., May 27.—The spring shipping season has opened with a big rush on the Prince Edward Island Railway, all the available freight cars are in use.

It is roughly estimated that over 100,000 bushels of potatoes and 200,000 bushels of oats will be shipped this season.

There will be a movement of potatoes all through June. Prices for potatoes range from 40 to 45 cents, and oats range from 40 to 42 cents.

Since it was decided to widen the gauge of the P. E. Island Railway, the building of box cars was curtailed.
