CHICAGO GRAIN MARKET

Chicago, Ill., Oct. 20.—Hedging sales from the northwest had a depressing effect, Saturday, on wheat. The market closed easy 1 to 1 1/2 under last night. Corn showed a net loss of 1 to 1 1/2 to 1, and oats finished unchanged to a sixteenth down.

Northwestern pressure on the selling side of wheat resulted from the fact that the week's terminal receipts were double those of a year ago. There were apparently no hedging by Chicago houses. Bullish sentiment here, however, had become dwarfed by the low bids for export business and by weakness at Winnipeg, where foreign activity develops first.

Russian official estimates of a greatly enlarged winter crop counted also in favor of the bears. About the only opposing influence came from week-end evening-up, few traders caring to stand out over Sunday. Price changes in December ranged from 92 to 92 1/2. The close 92 1/2 meant a loss of 1 to 1 1/2, compared with 24 hours before.

Better weather and scant de and tended to cheapen corn. December ranged between 53 1/2

and 53 1/2, closing steady, but 1 to 1 1/2 off at 53 1/2. Cash offerings were moderate. Oats suffered neglect, but held relatively steady. December kept within 32 1/2, and 32 1/2 with the close a shade net lower at 32 1/2.

Wheat: The late rally in America and firmness in Winnipeg yesterday prompted shorts to cover and opening values were 1 to 1 1/2 higher. Later the market turned dull and most of the advance was lost with the weather in United Kingdom fine and Russia pressing for sale and continued favorable advices from Argentina. Toward the close the market again became steady with less pressure to sell. Canadian offers and the forecast of smaller American shipments this week together with week-end covering on fears of political developments. Consols closed unchanged to 1-16 higher than yesterday and the feeling in financial circles was steady. At the close the market was steady but dull, 1 to 1 1/2 higher than yesterday. Corn opened 1 higher and later further advanced 1/2. European crop advices continue unfavorable, plate off, firmer and Buenos Ayres higher at close with American market firm. Cargoes were in better request and more firmly held.

SNOW AND RAIN

Today's weather map shows snow at four points, Vegreville and Wainwright, Alberta; Lanigan, Sask.; and Swan River, Man. The heaviest fall occurred at Vegreville, namely, three-fifths of an inch. Rain is reported at Prince Albert, Swift Current, Moose Jaw, Regina and Qu'Appelle, Sask., while cloudiness is general from Port William to Edmonton. Some low temperatures are recorded, 11 degrees above at Lanigan and 17 degrees at Wainwright being the lowest.
