Lieutenant-Governor McInnes has had four governments in two years. Two of them were dismissed, one with a majority at its back, and as regards the other he refused to permit the Legisla-ture to meet to see where it stood. A solid vote of the Legislature was recorded against the selection of Martin as Pre-mier, yet McInnes refused to obey this, and called upon him to form an admin-istration and arterwards dissolved the Legislature to permit of Martin appealce.
