21 Lives Lost When s.s. Penarth Struck a Shoal

Six Survivors Picked Up By a Trawler -Another Ship Wrecked in This Neighborhood.

London, Jan. 18 .- Twenty-one men of the crew of 27, of the British steamer Penarth, were drowned today off Norfolk coast.

Then Penarth, with a cargo of maize, was bound for Hull, and struck Sheeringham Shoal in a heavy gale, becoming a total wreck.

Six survivors from the Penarth were picked up by a trawler. Another British steamer is also believed to have been wrecked in the bound for Saint Nazaire, France.
