



Jajority for Cockshutt 408 By a decisive majority, scarcely ever equalled in the political history of the riding, Col. Harry Cockshuff, the win the war supporter of Union Government, endorsed by the Great War Veterans' Association was further endorsed by the electers of the riding yesterday when they selected him by the substantial majority of 385 as their next representative in the preliament of Canada. His nearest opponent, John Harold, the Unionist candidate, led the Laurier Liberal, Blackwell Doran, by a margin of 334 By a decisive majority, so Doran, by a margin of 834

rotes.

The riding of Brant, that has, since the beginning of the war, loyally sent its sons at the call of the empire, expressed its determination yesterday to continue in support of a policy of active prosecution of the war, and to send reinforcements to the soldier boys overseas. From cables that have been received from England and France by Col. Cockshutt, there can be little doubt but that the returns of yesterday will be greatly angmented when the overseas vote becomes known. There are approximately seven hundred men from the riding overseas.
