### Supreme Court Midsummer Term

Court opened on Wednesday morning Sept. 3rd., at 10 a. m. His Lordship Mr. Justice Ritchie presiding. The barristers present were B. W. Webster, K. C., W. E. Roscoe, K. C., H. H. Wickwire, K. C., F. C. Masters, J. Frank Outbit, B. W. Roscoe.

The first case for trial was the jury cause of L. Marchant Clarke vs Chief of Police Davis of Kentville, for false imprisonment. Mr. Masters was solicitor for plaintiff and Roscoe & Roscoe for defendant. A jury was empanelled with Ernest H. Johnson as foreman. The following witnesses were examined: the plaintiff and Messrs W. G. Church, Scott Burgess, and Stanley DeWolfe in rebuttal. Witnesses for defendant, Rupert Davis, Rufus Porter, J. E. Coleman, Warren Wheaton, Jennie Coleman, Charles Moore, Barclay Webster, Fred Mitchell. Several more witnesses were heard in the afternoon.

The jury after consideration for an hour returned with a verdict for the defendant.

Court adjourned at six p. m. Thursday morning court opened. Mr. Roscoe, K. C. moved for an order to continue the case of Chute vs Skinner.

The case of C. O. Cook vs W. W. Pineo was taken up for trial. W. E. Roscoe for plaintiff and L. A. Lovitt for defendant. The jury was Freeman A. Fenton, foreman, J. A. Dennison, Frank M. Eaton, George S. Taylor, Emery Coldwell, Judson Palsifer, Arthur Melnis, Hedley Graves. This case continued all through the day.
