Dr. A. W. Thornton A LARGE INCREASE

The British Forces to be Augmented to Nearly 600,000 Men.

Coloni la Will be Civen Commissions -Lord Roberts in Command at Modder River.

London, Feb, 12.-In the house of lords to-day, replying to a question as to whether Gen. Carrington was destined for a command in South Africa and whether Gen Methuen was still in command at Modder River, Lord Lansdowne answered that portion of the query referring to Gen. Carrington in the affirmative, and added:

"Gen Roberts is now at Modder River and in command of the whole forces there."

IN THE COMMONS. In the house of commons, A. J. Balfour denied the statement recently published that Sir Edmund J. Monson, British ambassador to France, had been temporarily ordered to withdraw from Paris, owing to the offensive attitude of the French press with regard to the war in South Africa.

Mr. Wyndham arose, amid scheers, when the house went into committee of supply and said that he did not propose to deal with the question of the prosecution of the war, but would immediately outline other military measures necessary for placing home measures necessary for placing home defence on a satisfactory footing. The government, he said, had not even considered the question of compulsory service, which was entirely unnecessary in view of the activity of recruiting for auxiliary forces. During the spring and summer the value ing the spring and summer the volun-teer artiflery will be rearmed. A teer artiflery will be rearmed. A mounted infantry volunteer corps and engineers necessary for two additional army corps would be raised forthwith, namely, 36 field batteries and seven horse batteries. The speaker also said it had been decided to raise 12 ad-

ditional infantry battalions.

Mr. Wyndham said the existing cavalry forces would also be expanded by seven regiments, and that commis-sions would be offered to militia officers, to the colonies and to the uni-versities. The latter announcement was received with cheers.

At present, the speaker pointed out, there were 109,000 regulars in the country, and the increase was anticipated to be 30,000. There were now 328,000 men in the auxiliary forces, and it was estimated the increase would be 50,000 men. So altogether, the country would have at least 517,-000 men, and Mr. Wyndham anticipar. ed that the number would be nearer 600,000 than half a million.
