BY BOER METHODS

The American Scout, Burnham, was Very Much Impressed.

to Describes a Rapid Trek and the Precentions Taken-Every Man Acts by Himself.

London, April 11. - A despatch to the Morning Post from Bloemfontein, dated April 9, gives a description by F. R. Burnham, the American scout with Gen. Roberts, of the Boer trek from Koorns spruit. Mr. Burnham

"Owing to a report that the British had occupied Brandfort and were mov-ing to Winburg, the course of the con-voy was altered, and the Boers pushed forward with increased speed toward Winburg. They expected cavairy pur-suit every hour, and the convoy was grotected with the greatest care and strotected with the greatest care and subtlety, the road being taken between keepies held and evacuated in succession by rear guards. The trek proceeded throughout Sinday, and on Monday morning the convoy was 10 miles from Winburg."

Mr. Burnham, explaining the Boer Mr. Burnham, explaining the grange for

methods of obtaining the range for rifle fire, says: "One man fired suc-cessive shots and watched the dust raised by the bullets, until accuracy was obtained, and he then communicated the range, to his comrades."

He was also struck by the "extraordinary fullness of the instructions given by the commanders to the men before any movement was begun."
