CATTLE MARKETS.

Cables Steady—Chicago Slightly Easier for Hogs.

Toronto Live Stock.

TORONTO, May 2.—Receipts of live stock at the City Market since Tuesday, as reported by the railways, were 104 car loads, composed of 1716 cattle, 1804 hogs, 124 sheep and lambs, with 189 calves.

Exporters.

Prices ranged from \$4.90 to \$5.25, but only one load was reported at the latter figure, the bulk selling at \$5.10 per cwt. Bulls sold at \$3.75 to \$4.25.

Butchers.

Prime picked lots of butchers' ranged from \$5 to \$5.25, and one lot was reported at \$5.30, but the cattle quoted at \$5.25 and \$5.30 were really exporters bought for butchers' purposes, and there were few of them. Loads of good, \$4.90 to \$4.95 per cwt.; fair to good, \$4.85 to \$4.90; good cows, \$4.25 to \$4.80; medium cows, \$3.50 to \$3.85; common cows, \$2.75 to \$3.25 per cwt.

Feeders and Stockers.

H. Murry reports only a fair demand this week for this line, the bulk of the demand being for good stockers, 800 lbs. and up to 1000 lbs. The demand for sheep was limited, a few loads selling from \$4.75 to \$4.90 per cwt., with a few as high as \$5.00, but they were light. The light, medium and common stockers are still very hard to sell, and the price has got to be made very low in order to make a sale. Several of this class had to be sacrificed at the close of the market. The stocker buyers are buying clear of this class. This is chiefly on account of the high cost of keeping them lying around the yards waiting for chance customers, and shippers are taking big chances in shipping them in unless they get them very low in the country and can take a bad price here, as in nearly every case the shipper has to look to the stocker buyers for a customer for this stuff. Prices ranged as follows: Steers, 1100 to 1200 lbs., \$4.80 to \$4.75; steers, 1000 to 1050 lbs., \$4.25 to \$4.50; steers, 800 to 900 lbs., \$3.50 to \$4.00; steers, 400 to 500 lbs., \$2.75 to \$3.00; common stockers, \$2.25 to \$3 per cwt.

Milch Cows.

About sixty cows were on sale for Wednesday and Thursday. The trade was much better than for several weeks, owing to several buyers from Montreal and Ottawa being on the market. Prices ranged all the way from \$30 to \$40 each, and one extra quality cow brought \$70. The bulk of sales were made at \$35 to \$40. The light, medium and common cows would have sold, and one dealer stated that good to choice cows would be in good demand next week.

Veal Calves.

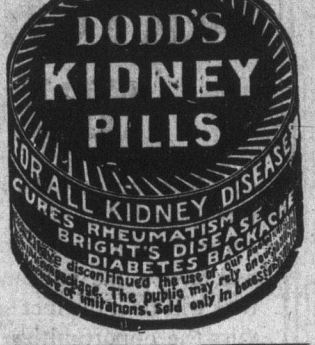
Good quality veal calves are scarce, and in brief demand, while common to medium are about steady, prices ranging from \$5 to \$6 per cwt., but prime new milked calves would bring more money.

Receipts of sheep and lambs were light.

and prices firm. Export ewes, \$6 to \$6.50 per cwt.; rams, \$5 to \$5.50; good yearling lambs, \$7.50 to \$8; common lambs, \$5.50 to \$6.50. One load of choice yearling ewes and wethers sold at \$5.25 per cwt.; spring lambs sold at \$5 to \$7 each. More prime quality lambs are wanted.

Hogs.

Mr. Harris, who got over 1000 hogs on Wednesday and Thursday reports prices unchanged at \$5.40 per cwt. for select and \$5.15 for light and fair.



VOLCANO STILL ACTIVE.

Stromboli Is Throwing Out Red-Hot Stones.

Naples, May 4.—The volcano on Stromboli Island is still very active, and is throwing up large quantities of red-hot stones. Prolonged subterranean rumblings are frequently heard. The lava is now taking its former course to the sea down the north side of the mountain. Showers of scoriae began again Thursday, but the inhabitants show no alarm.

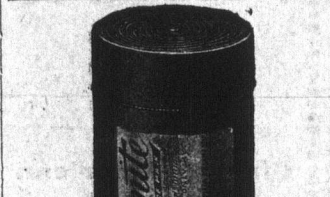
