The Directors of the West Kent Farmers' Institute met in the Haystack Hall this morning to transact business preliminary to holding the annual general meeting this afternoon.

### BOMB IN BOUQUET

Princess Ena And King Alfonso Have A Narrow Escape

Madrid, June 1.—The public rejoicings over the marriage of King Alfonso and Princess Victoria, had a terribly dramatic sequel at 2:30 o'clock yesterday afternoon, as a bomb thrown from an upper window exploded with deadly effect near the coach occupied by the King and Queen. Princess Ena, King Alfonso and the royal party escaped by an electric wire deflected the bomb, but at least 16 persons, most of them being of the personal and military escort, and others, spectators, were killed. Many others were injured. An official statement indicates a possibility that two bombs were thrown, one exploding in the air by striking a telegraph wire, and the other falling so close to the royal carriage that a groom at the head of the wheel horses was killed, as also were the wheel horses.

### RAN ON A SNAG

W. E. Wells and a young man named Moore had rather an unpleasant experience on the river last evening. They were coming up the river from the lighthouse in a gasolene launch behind the tug "Vic." They attempted to pass the bend by taking short cuts through the bends in the river with the result that they went too close to the shore at one of the bends and the launch ran on a snag. James McGregor, who was on the tug, was watching the proceedings and saw the front of the launch take a shoot up in the air. He says it looked very much as if the two men were trying to convert the launch into an air ship. After a few minutes work the launch was taken off the snag.

### FOR SPRING HORSE SHOWS

At the recent Session of the Legislature special votes were made in the interests of horse breeding. The Minister has decided that \$1,000 of the money voted shall be set aside to assist Spring Station Shows.

Any society desiring to participate in this grant must apply not later than the 15th of June next. Each application should contain information regarding the Show held previous to 1906, as well as the Show of 1906. A statement must be made that the prize list has amounted to at least one hundred dollars (\$100.00) and that prizes given for stallions have been for pure-bred stallions only, recorded in a reliable record.

And Gone were all the Guests Soon After the Band Concert had Nicely Commenced.

The band concert on Tecumseh Park last evening was rather a disappointment to the large crowd who went over to the Park to enjoy a few hours of music.
