## JAPS CLEARING COREA

Big Force of Russians From Vladivostock to Stop Them.

Clash to Come North of Tumen River -Russians Hold Only Two Positions South of That Water-South Sakhalin Is in Complete Possession by the Japanese After a Brisk Fight at Darlina-China's Role.

at Darlina—China's Role.

Tokio, July 16.—(2 p.m.)—It is officially announced that the Russian centre holding Darline and vicinity was attacked July 11, and offered stubborn resistance. The attack was removed at dawn of July 12, when the Japanese dislodged the Russians, driving rhem in the direction of Mauka. This victory ensures complete occupation of South Sakhalin by the Japanese, included among whom was Lieut. Maximta. Four field pieces, one machine gun and the ammunition warehouses were captured. The Japaneseloss was about 70 men killed or wounded. The Russians lost some 160 men. Reliable information has been received here that the Russian forces in Northern Korea have gradually been driven northward since last month, and now hold only two positions south of the Tumen River.

Investigations made by correspondents of the Associated Press show that neither flank has been turned, and that in fact the Russian wings, are more advanced than the centre. The Japanese centre is strengly fortified. Many siege guns have been emplaced along the Changtufu-Nanchenge line, and there is a triple ring of forts commanding the Mandarin-road. The Japanese are using novel elephant-trap style of entrenchments, consisting of ditches covered with platforms, which are balanced in the middle, and which till into vertical positions under the feet of the attackers.

St. Petersburg, July 17.—The terrorists are again at work in the city, with the result that the police precautions have been redoubled and guards posted about all of the prominent buildings. Two bomb factories have been unear hed within the last twelve hours, and a bold attempt to end the life of Governor-General Treporf failed by the narowest of margins.

The Governor-General had just left his carriage and entered his office, when some one unknown threw a bomb, which exploded on top of the coupe, shartering the vehicle and killing the driver and horses.

The bomb-thrower escaped in the confusion, but left behind some papers, through which it is hoped that his arrest will be accomplished.

The larger of the bomb factories discovered was near the Department of Railways and in it were concealed some twenty completed bombs and fifty pounds of dynamite. There were also thousand of copies of a proolamation summoning all "loyal Russians to commenorate on July 22 the blood-bath given them on January 20 by blowing up all soldiers and bartacks."

#### Irish Will Fight Redistribution

London, July 17.—The Government's proposal in regard to the redistribution of Parliamentary seats, while naturally received with the greafest bitterness by the Irish party and the Opposition is coming in for considerable criticism from its own party. The scheme keeps the membership of the House of Commons. The standard unit of population in relation to each representative is now about 54,000, with a proviso that no constituency under 15,000 shall is now about 54,000, with a proviso that no constituency under 15,000 shall noturn a member. The new scheme talses the minimum to 18,500 and the standard unit to 65,000. As a result brigland will gain 17 seats, Wales 1 and 5cotland 4, while Ireland will lose 22. ## 4 LIVES CRUSHED OUT

Seven Others Injured in Winnipeg's Wind Sterm Calamity.

Only Two Victims of the Sterm In Manitoba Outside of Winnipeg -Ternade Damaged the Wheat Very Little, as Its Full Ferce Was Confined to Eastern Parts Where There la Little Wheat.

Winnipeg, July 17.—Reports from the Province generally show that the damage done by the storm Friday night was not nearly so serious as was indicated by the destruction wrought in Winnipeg and the immediate vicinity, its full force being practically confined to eastern, parts, where there is little wheat, though some of this was knocked down. So far as is known at present there were only two victims to the fury of the tornado outside Winnipegs.

The collapse of the Hoover building cost four lives, Wm. Steinhoff, Bort White and two sisters, named Riley, were killed in the wreckage and the injured were F. Bennett of Acton, Ont. legs crushed: John Steinhoff, badly crushed: Dugald Ferguson. William Daly, Bert Gledhill, A. McCoomb and Kate Dow.

One of the most marvelous escapes was that of five men belonging to 13th Fleid Battery camp on exhibition grounds. A new plaster portice erected last year was blown down. The men were only found to be missing at roll call in the morning, but nevertheless they were rescued from the debris almost unscratched.

Mud Bank Derails Train.

Friday night's storm also caused an accident in the Rainy River district that might have been far more disastrous. At 2.25 o'clock Saturday merning the westbound steamship limited on the C.N.R. from Port Arthur to Winnipeg ran into a mud bank at a point between Nickle Lake and Rocky Inlet, near Fort Frances, Ont. The engine and baggage car were derailed, and Engineer Macey and Fireman Gorham, both of Rainy River, slightly scalded. None of the passengers were injured.

The accident was due to a mud slide, which blocked the track. Both Macey and Gorham siuck to the engine, but their injuries are not serious. The injured men were taken to Fort Frances Hospital.

Crops Pounded by Hail.

Windsor, July 17.—The violent storm of last week created wideapread damage throughout Essex County. Near Essex and within a radius of two miles the growing crops were slashed by a terrific hail storm. The storm was of the cyclone variety and came in a streak of about 100 yards wide and

swept on rer about two miles. It lasted-but twenty minutes, but did damage to the corn and tobacco crops conservatively estimated at \$25,000.
