Wolffville Philharmonic Society.

A number of the music-loving people of Wolffville assembled at the residence of our townman, Dr. G. E. DeWitt, on Monday evening and proceeded to organise the Wolffville Philharmonic Society—the object of which is the musical education of its members and to advance the musical interest of the town generally.

Temperance Sunday.

At the suggestion of the London S. S. Union, endorsed by the W. C. T. U., the great religious bodies of the world, has decided to observe November 24th, as Temperance Sunday all over the world, and it is proposed that Special Sermons should be preached from every Pulpit in the two spheres on that day.

In connection with this movement a Special Temperance Lesson has been selected by the International Sunday School Lesson Committee for that date; and all Superintendents of Sunday Schools are earnestly invited to emphasize this teaching on this subject on that occasion.

An immense deposit of chronic iron ore, discovered on the west side of Port-au-Port Bay, Newfoundland, has been purchased by a large combination in the United States. Professor Maynard, formerly of Yale, and an enterprising engineer for the company, has visited the place and thoroughly studied the deposit. The length of the seams is 240 feet on the surface, and there are eight veins varying in width from five to twelve feet of solid "prill" ore, of which seven cubic feet weigh a ton.

There has never been an exact geographical definition of where the East ceases and the West begins in America, but the American Board of Foreign Missions has decided upon the Mississippi River as the boundary line between the Eastern and Western States. Not so long ago, all the States beyond New York were regarded as "out west", and it seems odd even now to class Wisconsin and Illinois amongst Eastern States.

In addition to the 3 cent Letter Cards previously issued by the Post Office Department, two new denominations of Letter Cards of the value of 1 cent and 2 cents respectively are now supplied to the public. These cards are not to be confounded with ordinary post cards, inasmuch as, admitting of being sealed they serve in the fullest sense the purpose of letters; the 1 cent cards being available for local use in places where the drop letter rate is one cent, and the 2 cent cards in places where the rate is two cents.
