

# BINDON'S LIVERY

Fireman Charles Wilson Jr., Sustained Several Factured Ribs By Falling from Roof.

The livery stable of Mr. H. Binfrom being totally destroyed by fire

vesterday afternoon, but as it was damage was inflicted to the extent of nearly one thousand dollars, covered in insurance in a company of which Mr. J. A. Macdonald is local agent. The fire is believed to have orig-

inated from a spark on the roof and owing to everything being as dry as tinder, it made rapid headway. For a time the residences of H. Bindon, Thomas Pearson and James Jarvie wer in danger, all three being set on tire on several occasions by burning embers from the stable, but the incipient fires were extinguished by willing hands with the aid of small streams of water from garden hose.

Mr. Bindon's loss included four tons of hay, some grain and several cutters and sleighs which were stowed away in the hay loft.

During the progress of the fire Mr. Chas. Wilson, Jr., a member of the Fire Department, was injured by falling off the roof of the Jarvie residence onto the rear steps, sustaining several fractured ribs and probably internal injuries. The injured man was taken to his home on Haliburton street and his injuries attended to by Dr. Ingham.
