CONFIRMATION OF HUNTING FATALITY IS RECEIVED HERE

Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon Receives Report of Gloucester Co. Tragedy.

OLIVER LANDRY WAS VICTIM OF ACCIDENT

Hunting Moose With a Dog When Shot in the Back by Cousin's Rifle.

Chief Game Warden L. A. Gagnon stated this morning that he had received official confirmation of the shooting fatality near Upper Pocomouche, Gloucester county, of which he had been advised a few days ago, although the names of the parties concerned were unknown at that time.

The victim of the accident was Oliver Landry, who with his brother William Landry, and George Landry, all of Upper Pocomouche, had been hunting a moose with a dog.

The circumstances of the shooting were immediately reported to Stanislaus Landry, a Justice of the Peace at Upper Pocomouche, by George Landry.

HOUSE AND BARN DESTROYED BY FIRE AT BARKER'S POINT

Roof Fire During Gale Destroys Home of Merritt Jordan—Barn Follows.

FURNITURE TAKEN OUT OF BURNING HOUSE

Barn Fire Was Discovered by a Neighbor After House Had Burned.

Fire completely destroyed the house and barn of Merritt Jordan, Richbrooke Road, Barker's Point, last evening and only the presence of ice and snow on the roofs of nearby dwellings and buildings saved them from destruction in the high wind which prevailed.

The Jordan home was destroyed as the result of a roof fire which broke out about 4 o'clock and which was fanned by the gale. Hampered by lack of fighting apparatus, the residents of Barker's Point were able to do little more than to remove some of the furniture from the building which was soon a mass of flames.

About 8 o'clock the barn, situated some little distance from the house, caught fire and was also reduced to ashes. The barn contained a large quantity of hay which burned furiously and gave off large quantities of dense smoke.
