can get it," said His Lordship, "this is not a question of evidence, but of fact."

"I don't see if this writ is returnable to-morrow how it can be argued to-morrow," said Mr. Justice Teetzel.

"I think the Divisional Court will put it on the list," said His Lordship.

"But it is only one day," insisted Mr. Staunton.

"Well, make it Wednesday, then," said the Judge.

"That will satisfy me," said Mr. Cartwright.

"Very well then," said His Lordship, "the writ will be returnable on Wednesday."

"His Lordship then directed that the warrant for Miss Kinrade's arrest, together with a copy of the evidence given by Detective Miller, which led to the warrant being issued, be filed with the registrar of the Divisional Court."

THE JUDGMENT. Following is the text of order made by Justice Teetzel:

The men suspected of instigation of the mutiny of April 13 have been separated from the main bodies of prisoners, and will be tried by court martial.

Two hundred of the Sultan's Albanian soldiers stationed at the imperial palace at Yildiz persistently refuse to surrender their quarters, which are adjacent to the main gates of the palace enclosure.

The correspondent repaired to the scene of this threatened trouble. "Some of his Majesty's children are disobedient," remarked the officer commanding the approach to the gates of the palace.

Constantinople, April 25.—Tewfik Pasha, the grand vizier, this morning transmitted to the Sultan the resignation of the entire cabinet and communicated this fact to parliament.

CONDITIONS IMPOSED ON SULTAN. Berlin, April 25.—The Constantinople correspondent of the Lokai newspaper telegraphs that he learns that the Sultan of Turkey will be allowed to remain on the throne, but on condition that he gave guarantees against a relapse to absolutism.
