Eggs are one of the cheapest foods to be had to take the place of meat. The principal food element furnished by eggs is protein, the nitrogenous tissuebuilding element, the presence of which in considerable proportions also gives meats, fish; milk, cheese, etc., their special food value. In addition to protein, eggs also furnish fat and a number of valuable elements, including sulphur, phosphorus, iron, calcium and magnesium in an easily assimilated form , and are believed also to be rich in certain essential vitalizing elements called vitamins. SLIGHT INCREASE IN RATES EFFECTIVE FIRST MAY

Owing to the greatly increased cost of all materials, labor, etc., required for the production of a daily newspaper, The Journal finds it is obliged to make slight increases in its advertising rates beginning the first of May. In looking over our books we find that considerable advertising is being carried at the same price as before the war, and yet every person realizes that the cost of almost everything has increased from fifty to 100 per dent. Some of the advertisements have, it is found, been carried below cost and few of them at any profit. Obligations have been assumed by the paper to improve its mechanical equipment so as to put out a larger and better paper, and in announcing small advances here and there the business public will appreciate that the new rates will bear the closest analysis and comparison.

Recently The Journal wrote to the managers of other dailies in the Province and got copies of their rate cards. Wel find that for display, both local and foreign, the rates range considerably higher than those which have been charged by The Journal. An announgement will be made later as to the rates that will go into effect but they will not amount to enough to any one advertiser to be worth any objection from him, we feel certain, but a little advance here and there, distributed over hundreds of users in a year, will make the road a little easier to travel
