Mr. Jas. Vavasour, of Duckworth St., has in his possession a picture of the late King Edward VII. when he was Prince of Wales. The original was drawn on stone by J. A. Winter, a celebrated artist, and was loaned by her late Majesty Queen Victoria to be copied in 1860. Very few copies are now extant, so that this picture is a rare one. Mr. Vavasour also has a handsome snuff box of tortoise shell which was once owned by the late Archdeacon Bridge. The Archdeacon was his godfather, and Mr. Vavasour prizes the souvenir very much.

Roofing No. 120. Roofing separated into layers, curling and pulling away from the nails. Felt fibres too short.

Roofing No. 124. Impregnation oozing through the coating. Mottled appearance. Yellow discoloration. Contains liquid asphaltum.

## The Branch Railway.

People who arrived here by the express Saturday said that about nine miles of the branch railway have been finished to date. Under foreman Burton a gang of graders and others have moved to Seal Cove, and the work of grading has been completed as far as Brooklyn, B.B. After touching Seal Cove the line will make a detour towards Trinity, across the country, touching as near as possible to Indian Arm or Summerville. The line will be continued on to the S.W. Arm of Trinity, thence to Trinity town, passing close to Bremner's property, now owned by Ryan Bros., continuing down around the N. W. Arm to Ship Cove and Robin Hood and on to Catalina. The most difficult piece of engineering was to get into Trinity and get out again, but it was successfully accomplished. Over 250 men are employed ballasting and track laying, and do good work daily. The whole line may be open to traffic by the end of the year.
