## In the Assembly.

There was not much doing in the House yesterday. There was the usual batch of petitions presented. Mr. Earle commenced the presentation, setting forth that Joe Batt's Arm wanted another road, Fogo a well. Seldom Come By to exterminate dogs; coastal service, telephones and roads formed the burden of the prayers of Salvage Bay and Happy Adventure, as presented by the Hon. Minister of Justice, Hon. C. Emerson. Mr. Clapp made it clear that Boyd's Cove needed a telephone service and the call of coastal boats; Mr. Clapp presented a petition, forwarded by Father O'Rourke of Bonne Bay, which set forth the necessity of erecting a lighthouse at Ferrol Point. Mr. Clapp showed that the fishermen of St. Barbe's were not abundantly blessed with lights, and emphasized the need of granting this request and attending to wants of like nature elsewhere in the district.

Sir Robert Bond gave notice of question in relation to the landing of certain cables on the island, and Mr. Clift gave notice of question in relation to marine grants allocated for District of Twillingate, and as to whether a license of occupation of land at Peter's Arm had been granted to Dr. A. C. Ames.

In reply to Mr. Clapp's question as to a steam service for White Bay, the Hon. Colonial Secretary stated that the routes and service referred to, have been within the past twelve months discussed by the Government with residents from the District. The Government recognize that something will have to be done.

The Cold Storage Bill passed the Committee Stage and on the report stage was challenged by the Opposition, but carried by 14 to 7.

The Esquimaux Deportation Bill was read a second time on motion of the Minister of Justice and supported by the leader of the Opposition, Sir R. Bond, who advocated the inclusion of the Montagnais Indians within its scope. This suggestion the Minister promised to take into consideration.

## Ice Packed Inshore.

To-day owing to the prevalence of a N.E. wind heavy ice is packed right along the coast from Cape St. Francis south, and it is impossible for shipping to leave or enter port. It is very heavy on the outside, the slob being pressed in close on the land. Reports round the city are to the effect that large numbers of old seals are in Conception Bay.

**NORTHERN ICE REPORT.**—Reports from mostly all the northern bays to the Fisheries Department, to-day show that they are filled with ice and slob. Bonaville Bay reports 6 miles of ice on the south side of the bay, which a heavy steamer would get through.

## S.A. Band Concert.

The Salvation Army Band—19 instruments—returned from Clarke's Beach to-day. They gave a band concert at Clarke's Beach last night, which was very successful and largely attended. The receipts were about \$50.

The D. P. Ingraham returned from Cape St. Francis last night at 8 o'clock having successfully landed coal for the lighthouse. Capt. Rose made an attempt to go to the rescue of the S. S. Euphrates, but the ice packed Cape St. Francis last night at 8 o'clock too heavy to get to her.

In the police court to-day two disorderlies were each fined \$2 or 7 days. A seaman, drunk and disorderly, was put on board his vessel, the Clementine.

## Overcome by Gas.

Just after the employees of A. J. Harvey & Co.'s Bakery went to work this morning at 6 o'clock the gas bag attached to the engine burst suddenly with a loud report, and immediately the apartment was filled with the escaping coal gas. Two boys who were working near, Charles Johnston and Robert Smith, were overcome with the gas and became unconscious, in which condition they remained so long that those about feared that the accident would bear a fatal result. Smith especially was so ill that it was a long while before he came to, and the other lad after reviving was driven to his home, Belvidere Street, where he was attended by a doctor. After a few hours Smith returned to work. Had the boys been alone in the place they would have been asphyxiated.

## DISORDERLIES ARRESTED.

Yesterday afternoon two men appeared on Water Street in an intoxicated condition and were arrested by Constable Keefe. Both kicked out and one had to be handcuffed and brought to the station. The other tried to take him away from the officer and was also arrested.

## House Burnt Down.

By passengers who arrived by the express last night we learn that a house was burnt to the ground at Bishop's Falls. Most of the furniture and nearly all the clothing was destroyed, while the owner and his family had a very narrow escape from being burnt to death. We understand that no insurance was carried on the building or contents and the loss is a very heavy one, the savings of a lifetime being swept away.
