OTTAWA, April 26.

The the Government must abandon Reciprocity, or go to the country, was the decision arrived at by the Conservative members of Parliament this morning. Reports received from all over the country, especially from the West, indicate a popular verdict overwhelmingly against the pact. The opposition are convinced that it is their duty to prevent the Fielding-Knox agreement being ratified until a mandate is obtained from the electorate. It is by no means certain what course the Government will pursue. A caucus has been hurriedly called for to-morrow, when the policy of the Government will be settled. At present the impression is general that the Reciprocity agreement will go over, and that an early prorogation may be expected.

Hints to Householders.

PROFESSOR HENRY ADAMS in his Presidential Address to the Institute of Sanitary Engineers early in 1908, said:—"Gas fires for heating are already widely adopted for offices, consulting rooms where a fire may be required at short notice. I have had thirty years and do not find any of the ill effects that have been ascribed to gas fires."

Gas fires are universally used by Medical men in London, and they recommend them for use in the homes of their patients.

The Coal Smoke Abatement Society, among whose members are many men of high scientific and artistic attainment, are strong advocates of the use of gas for heating. The Society carried out a most elaborate series of tests with gas fires, etc., in May and June, 1906.

The Algerine finished discharging yesterday afternoon. Her turn-out was 24 young harps, 2,583 young dogs, 400 bedlamers, 116 old harps, 1,222 old hoods; total, 4,425. Gross weight, 156 tons, 11 cwt., 1 qr., 24 lbs. Net weight, 141 tons, 1 cwt., 1 qr., 9 lbs. Gross value, \$10,600.22. Net value, \$10,430.22. Her crew of 206 men shared \$16.02 each.

The Newfoundland turned out a total of 11,122 seals; apportioned as follows: 5,460 young harps, 5,666 young hoods, 5 bedlamers, 78 old harps and 1,912 old hoods. Vessels Have Stormy Voyage.

The barqt. Dunure, Capt. Hartery, arrived here at 1.30 p.m. yesterday from Bahia via Barbadoes, molasses laden to Bowring Bros. The ship left Bahia on the 21st February and had a tedious voyage to Barbadoes, making the run in 24 days. Having loaded molasses she left again and was 27 days on the run here, being at Cape Ballard on the 21st day. She had a series of gales from W.S.W., N.W. and N.E., with a terrific sea. After making Cape Ballard Wednesday week she was forced by the storms back into Trepassay Bay, and was there in company with the Maggie from Wednesday last until Tuesday evening, reaching the whole time from Cape Race to Cape St. Mary's. She was in company with the Lake Simcoe for 4 days after leaving Barbadoes. The Dunure had some of her sails torn and her gaffs broken. After making Cape Ballard without damage. The Dunure went down to Bahia in 35 days. In connection with the arrival of the ship yesterday we stated that she had lost one of her crew, named Whalen. This was an error. The crew of the Dunure are all alive and well.

The barqt. Maggie, Capt. Parsons, arrived here yesterday afternoon from Bahia via Barbadoes, molasses laden to Jas. Baird, Ltd. She left Bahia on the 16th February, had a tedious run to Pernambuco, but made good time from there to Barbadoes. She left there on March 23rd and had a voyage which was one of the roughest in Capt. Parsons' lengthy experience. After passing Bermuda she had some stiff breezes until April 12th, after which a hurricane was encountered from the N.E. with a mountainous sea. She was holed and for a while it looked as if she might founder. Sea after sea inundated the decks, and to avert such danger it was decided to jettison the cargo, and cutting through the bulk headings the heads of about 50 to 60 puncheons of molasses were burst in and it was pumped quickly out of the hold. This lightened her, but the ship was drifting the whole time in a southerly course and was driven fully 150 miles off her course. She had south and east breezes after this, and Wednesday week struck a hurricane from the N.E. with snow, so that she had to run around Cape Race and keep in Trepassay Bay till Tuesday. Sunday night she struck a heavy N.E. wind with thick snow, and this lasted till Tuesday last, when she ran under Cape Pine till the hurricane abated. Several icebergs were met between here and Cape Race, and "growlers" which were more dangerous than the bergs. During the storms of Monday and Tuesday one of the jibs was blown clean out of the bolt ropes, the topsail, mainsail and other canvas were torn in pieces by the gales, and the vessel generally had a hard time.
