### Work of Storm.

IN THE CITY.

The storm which commenced Satur-  
day evening had continued all yester-  
day wrought much havoc in the city.  
The wind veered from the north west  
and raged with great velocity, and  
people living in isolated houses must  
have been badly frightened. At 8.30  
Saturday night the chimney of a house  
on Hayward Avenue, occupied by a  
family named Thomas, founded,  
caused by the strong wind.  
About midnight a large shed be-  
longing to Harvey & Co. which is  
covered with corrugated iron was  
practically demolished. The roof was  
blown off it and landed on another  
store. Work of repairs began this  
morning.

Yesterday shipping was unable to  
berth at the piers along the water-  
front. There was a heavy undertow  
in the harbour and the tide was un-  
usually high. The water was up level  
with the wharves. As a result of the  
gale there must have been much dam-  
age caused at sea, yet unreported.

#### IN THE COUNTRY.

Saturday evening a S. W. gale pre-  
vailed across country and veered to  
N. W. during the night, the wind  
reaching hurricane force. It snowed  
at night, and the wind which was  
drifting hard at Millertown Jct.  
and Quarry early yesterday. Most of  
the bay and coastal boats could not  
run owing to the high wind which  
abated yesterday forenoon but again  
blew with much force last night.
