Could This Be Done?

I have a vocational suggestion for a woman with certain rather rare and yet not by any means extraordinary gifts. A few weeks ago a friend of mine sent his setter to be trained by a man whose business it is to train dogs for hunting.

The dog has a come back. He is not only well-trained for hunting, but he has also been disciplined out of his most trying puppy ways by this man. He was a very obstreperous puppy; he is now a very manageable young dog and will remain so until his master spoils him.

Why Not a Trainer for Obstreperous Children?

No, I am not advocating dog training as a feminine profession, but why shouldn't a woman who has the peculiar gifts which make one capable of training children set up as a child trainer and take obstreperous children to train?

We are coming to recognize that although nature always sends the love with the baby, she frequently omits to include the ability to manage the child.

I know of more than one mother who, while she loves her child with all her heart, does not understand him or know how to manage him. Such a mother fluctuates between unreasoning strictness and over-indulgence. Her nagging, her impatience, the reaction of her nerves against the child's make him more and more difficult to manage as time goes on.

Now if a child like that could be turned over for two or three months

Of course it would take a woman peculiarly gifted in regard to children. She would have to have tact, firmness, patience, self-control, and that rare sympathetic imagination that alone can make it possible for a grown-up to pass by the portals and enter the heart of a child.

She would have to be one of those unusual adults who can keep from uttering a command to a child every few seconds and who can stand immutably by a command once it has been given, even though it be much easier to yield.

Furthermore, the child would have to be absolutely given over to the trainer, for interference or division of authority would be fatal to the training.

The Wants-to-be-cynic interrupted me at this point as we discussed the subject.

"Very fine," said he; "but you forgot one thing."

"What?"

"How About Training The Parent?"

"After the child had been back home a week, he'd be the same child he was before. You'd have to train the parents as well as the child."

He was wrong. I hadn't forgotten. But as one always does in regard to the one difficulty in the way of an otherwise alluring plan, I tried to ignore it.

The child trainer might supply a resume of her methods to the parents when she returned the child; or she might spend a week or two with them

Training Teachers.

Editor Evening Telegram.

Dear Mr. Editor.—In Tuesday's issue of your popular paper you devote some editorial space and comment to Supt. Burke's Educational Report from which I gather that he states in effect that teachers are improperly trained at present and they should devote three-fourths of their time to gaining knowledge of their profession. Despite the learned Doctor's opinions upon educational and other questions I beg to take issue with him upon this point and argue the proposition should be reversed or greatly modified. I would ask what would be the consequences of an apprentice in the trades or handicrafts devoting three-fourths of his time to sports and one-fourth to training for his trade. It would be the nonsense of absurdity to think you could have a skilled tradesman or handicraftsman. Lawyers, doctors, clergymen and artisans need special and long-drawn out training for their business and the same is true of the teacher but in a far greater degree as he has to train the most important of all things the human mind. Apart from this subject I would ask Dr. Burke to let some light shine on the appointment of the favourite district grant and the High School grant and how some education districts can sport two so-called High Schools and others deserving can't get a look in at all!

Fishery Report.

The following reports from the fishery are now posted at the Board of Trade:

July 31st. From W. Hogan, (Frappeau to Peter's River)—The catch to date is 8715 but for last week practically nothing. Eight boats and 35 dories and skiffs but no traps are fishing. Prospects are fair for trawls and bait continues plentiful. The fish struck in for trawls, jiggers and coheits during the last week near Broad Cove, St. Shott's. The lobster fishery is closed.

July 31st. From D. Blandford, (Shoe Cove Point to Greenspond)—Prospects are poor, but there is enough for bait. Traps have been doing fairly well and there is a little improvement with hook and line and nets. Three boats, 8 traps and 75 dories and skiffs are fishing. The total catch is 1400 qtls. with 350 for last week.

July 31st. From W. R. Andrews, (Great Jervis Head to Pass Island)—There is a good sign of codfish and squid is also appearing. With this bait boats are getting about a quintal of cod per day at Hermitage. Those who engaged at the lobster fishery did as well as last year.

July 31st. From P. Fahy, (West-arm Bay to Grate's Cove)—The catch to date is 35,000 qtls. and for last week 12,000. Three hundred traps and 450 dories and skiffs are fishing.

Aug. 7th. From T. Hogan, (Carbonear to Western Bay)—There has been no fishing done since Tuesday on account of the storm but there is a sign of squid for bait. The total catch is 2650 qtls. and for last week 220. Thirty-five punts and 140 traps are fishing.

Italian Press Contemptuous of "Divine Aid" Given the Germans.

Milan, Aug. 5.—The Kaiser's proclamation excites more contempt than indignation in Italy. The Popolo Italia summarizes excellently the view of the press and public:

"On account of the late hour when we received this document of the Kaiser," said the Popolo, "it is not possible to comment on it, but, after all, comment is needless."

"The cynical impudence of William II is once more recorded in his prose inspired by the tragic anniversary. The Kaiser invokes too often his own peculiar god, but it is clear that the document was meant for domestic consumption. It is addressed to the German people, which have begun to tremble with cold and fear at the prospect of a second winter campaign. The Allies won't begin a useless polemic. This they intrust to the cannon of the Quadruple Entente, which will send a reply to the lying message of the Kaiser."

French General at Dardanelles IS REPLACED.

Paris, Aug. 6.—An official report given out by the French War Office to-day, reads as follows:—

"The Government has decided to replace General J. E. Gouraud, commander of the French expeditionary force at the Dardanelles, by General Sarrail, who has been named commander-in-chief of the Army of the Orient."
