

M. C. L. I.

The M.C.L.I. held its usual weekly meeting last night, owing to Bible Society meeting to-night. The subject for debate was, "That it is as much the duty of the State to teach Practical Business as it is to teach common school studies." Mr. S. Woods, leader for the affirmative, briefly, regriaving the search briefly. briefly reviewing the growth and development of commercial and industrial life, especially during the last century, showed how necessary was Practical Business training or Technical Education, as taught by Technical and Business Colleges and also in manual training classes. The boy by means of his technical education

would be efficiently trained and business could only be improved.

Mr. A. Soper, leader for the negative, declared Technical Education to be unpractical, the common elementary studies as taught in the schools, if properly taught, would be amply sufficient for a boy to start in life. The cost and difficulty of finding technical teachers to send around the island, also the trouble of selecting suitable professions for industries for a boy not old enough to judge for

imself.

No T. Soper, for the affirmative, showed how difficult it is for boys to receive technical education along the lines of their trade or profession and technical colleges should be estab-lished. How many accidents are caus-

ed by unskilled workmen?

Mr. Parkins, for the negative, declared himself in favor of scientific teaching along the lines of local in-dustries and the fisheries, but this was not Practical Business training, only one out of four would receive any real benefit. Mr. J. Baggs be-lieved that common elementary stud-ies are not sufficient, and boys ought to be given a chance to study acquire a thorough knowledge of their profession or trade. Mr. W. Peters, for the negative, thought that a boy who was given a good grouding in elementary studies was capable of developing himself along the lines of his trade. Lively discussion followed, six or seven speakers taking part, and on the vote being taken the negative won by a fair majority.
