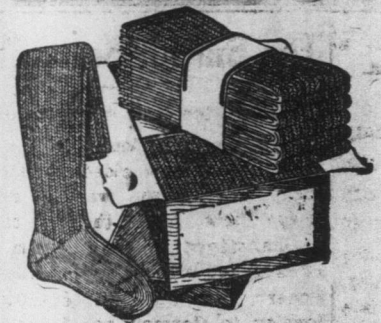

Terrier Followed Master to the Front.

Interviewed regarding Prince, the Irish terrier that is wagging his tail in the kennels of Royalty, the London Society for Prevention of Cruelty to Animals says nothing of the dog's famous journey following his master, Pte. Brown, of the North Staffordshire Regiment, in September, 1914, from Hamersmith, London, to Arras, France. The "Bowley Hais," or military police, have at last completed the authentic record of the most complete case illustrating a dog's sixth sense. When Brown marched away Prince was left behind. A week later the dog disappeared. It has now been duly established that the animal trotted seventy-six miles to Folkestone. He was two weeks getting aboard the transport, being kicked off several times before he finally succeeded in establishing himself on board. In Boulogne this remarkable dog climbed up a hill to a rest camp, where he hung around a soup kitchen three weeks before getting started again astride his master's scent. Another sixty-mile jaunt spread before him, with strange dogs barking and snapping at him along the entire route. Prince never faltered, and with eyes protruding and tail gesticulating he affectionately appeared before him, amazed master three weeks later at Arras, where he became mascot of the regiment, serving throughout the war.
