The Hon. J. H. Cameron, applied then on behalf of the prisoner, for leave to appeal to the Privy Council in England. The learned Counsel stated that four Colonies had this right to appeal to England, but the Privy Council refuses to hear an appeal unless the Clerk of the Court certifies that the appeal has been allowed by the Colonial Court. It appeared, he said, that this course was rendered necessary in cases of a criminal character.

The President asked whether any case could be pointed out where a case like this on a Writ of Error was referred to the Privy Council. In this case, clearly, the diversity of opinion was such that no application for leave to appeal could be refused, if before our own Courts. But the case here was different. They were asked to grant it where they had not the Privy Council; nor can our refusal deprive them of any right to hear the case.

Mr. Cameron—But a rule of the Privy Council's procedure requires leave from the Colonial Court.

The President—Strictly speaking this is not an appeal; it is a case of writ of error.

C. J. Hagarty asked if Mr. Cameron was sure that the Privy Council has a right to hear this case on appeal from the Colony.
