—Mrs. Henry Delang, William street, is visiting Windsor friends.

—Ex-Ald. A. B. Powell may appeal from the decision of the courts unseating him as representative of No. 2 ward.

—Major J. A. Heskoth, London, was yesterday elected a member of the executive committee of the Ontario Artillery Association.

—The customs collections at the London custom house for February, 1895, were \$49,701.30, against \$43,223.16 in February, 1894, an increase for 1895 of \$6,478.14.

—Rev. J. G. Stuart, of Toronto, has accepted the call to the pastorate of Knox Church, South London, and the Toronto Presbytery has sanctioned it. His pulpit in Toronto will be declared vacant on April 7.

—A Bay City (Mich.) dispatch says: "Assistant City Treasurer Galt received a telegram today announcing the death of his mother at Denfield, Ont., at the advanced age of 93 years. Her husband died two years ago, aged 92 years.

—The rooms of Chorazin Lodge, I. O. O. F., in the East End Hall, are being enlarged. The lodge has entered into a new lease with the city, and besides the old rooms on the third story, has secured the use of two large rooms on the second floor.

—While Mrs. W. Langridge was adjusting a picture at her home yesterday afternoon, the stepladder on which she was standing suddenly gave way and she was precipitated to the floor, suffering a severe strain of the right ankle, which will necessitate her remaining at home for a couple of weeks.

—Mr. James Clarke received a telegram informing him of the death of his son-in-law, Mr. A. Doyle, of St. Thomas, formerly proprietor of the Novelty Pump Works in this city, and later in the same business in St. Thomas. His ailment was abscess of the liver, to which he succumbed after six weeks' illness. He leaves a wife and three children.

—The regular monthly meeting of the London branch of the Mission to Lepers in India and the East was held in Somerset Hall Monday afternoon. An interesting programme was presented by the president, Mrs. Robertson. The Bible lesson was conducted by Mrs. Boyd, and was especially appropriate to the occasion. An excellent essay on the Almoraz asylum was read by Miss Morris, and Miss Purdum gave a very interesting account of the lepers of Robben Island. Owing to the stormy state of the weather the attendance was smaller than usual.

A city correspondent writes: "A suggestion re City Hall alterations. Why not sell the old City Hall property out and out, which has outlived its usefulness, and build more modern buildings on a new site. ## PATRONS IN CAUCUS.

Propose to Modify the Power of the Medical Council.

Mr. Howland's New Line of Attack on the Government's Municipal Policy.

(Special to the ADVERTISER.)  
PARLIAMENT BUILDINGS, TORONTO, March 5.—Possibly the most important event of today was the caucus which the Patrons held in the pleasant room in the south-western corner of the building. It was important in that it decided upon the delay of their attack upon the Medical Council, Mr. Haycock's bill, which was put in in blank, being considered and got into shape. The bill will aim at depriving the council of its control over the examinations, which have been such a trouble to the Patrons.

Patrons argue, as the matriculation examinations are made uniform and are under the management of a board on which the various medical colleges are represented, so the final examinations will be made uniform in the same way, and what they will propose is that they be left to a board composed of one member from each of the medical colleges, three from the council and be nominated by the Lieutenant-Governor in council. Furthermore the Patrons intend to strike off the power of the council to try charges against physicians and to have such charges tried before the ordinary courts; to that end they will press to have the term "unprofessional conduct" in the act defined. Finally they will move to have the council obliged to collect its fees from physicians through the ordinary courts.

The House sat this afternoon and listened for two hours and a half to Mr. Howland's budget. Without being too ill-natured it might be pointed out that Mr. Howland's views upon the purpose of the budget debate have undergone a considerable change in the last few days. A week ago he was arguing that it was a detailed audit of the Provincial Administration for which several days' possession of the public accounts would be needed, but today the point of his very elaborate introduction was that the debate was a general review of the Provincial Administration. Mr. Howland's speech was rather a departure from the ordinary run. It was very long for one thing and was a collection of his views upon a great variety of topics, and for another thing he surprised his friends by coming out with a glowing sketch of the success and progress of the Ontario Agricultural College at Guelph. The Liberals, scarcely believing their ears, cheered heartily at this tribute from a Conservative while the Conservatives sat in gloomy silence. Upon the timber policy he had nothing new to say, but he developed a new line of attack with regard to the Government's municipal policy, his theory being that the Government should exercise a supervision over municipal expenditure and was thus responsible for the high taxation in Toronto and for the boom. There was no session in the evening, the speaker giving his first dinner of the session.

PIITTSBURG, Pa., March 5.—Ten thousand railroad miners in the Pittsburgh district struck today for an advance of 14 cents per ton, or 69 cents and the Columbus agreement.

WILMERDING, Pa., March 5.—After 7 months of an almost complete shut down the Westinghouse air brake works here have started up in full on double turn. Three thousand men from now on will find employment here steadily.
