Uncle Sam's Tariff.

Senators Busy Doctoring the Dingley Bill.

Its Author Will Hardly Know It When It Comes Up for Passage.

Washington, April 21.—The members of the sub-committee of the Senate Finance Committee, having in charge the tariff bill, were on the floor yesterday, talking to their colleagues and preparing the way for a meeting of the full committee. The sub-committee is approaching the end of its labors, and various senators, who are making persistent demands for changes, were called upon with a view to arriving at an understanding.

Among the problems which are yet unsettled are those relating to sugar, lead ore and wool. Some senators have manifested a disposition to hold out persistently for certain modifications of the schedules referring to these and other articles. The members of the committee, while not indicating their own position or that of the committee, have thought it well to talk over these matters with the complaining senators. They are anxious to bring in a bill that will command the united support of the Republican party, and that will be sure to become a law.

Members of the committee told their colleagues that many reductions have been made from beginning to end of the bill, because of the belief on the part of the committee that some of the House rates were practically prohibitive. They have listened patiently to advocates of increases, but have granted few of the requests.

One of the members said that the bill would be a revenue bill, and not a prohibitive bill. The committee has practically agreed upon a modification of the retroactive clause of the Dingley Bill, which is, it is hoped, will be satisfactory to the opponents of the House provision. The wool men are still pressing for radical changes. The wool growers are not satisfied with the rates of the mantle amendment, but want a complete change of classification, and still insist that no wools shall be admitted for less than 8 cents a pound. While some changes are probable in this schedule, it is quite certain that these demands will not be entirely met.

Another Bad Outbreak of Hog Cholera in Essex.

Windsor's Tax Rate Struck at Twenty-Three Mills.

Burglars Busy in Sarnia—Three Places Entered.

Windsor tax rate has been struck at 23 mills on the dollar.

Fire destroyed the residence of Mr. Russell, Park avenue west, Chatham, on Monday. It was insured for \$3,000. The oldest hotel building in Windsor was torn down Saturday. It was the St. Patrick Hotel, situated on Sandwich street west.

The dwelling house of Mr. John Turner, of Cowal, was burned to the ground Sunday with all the contents. At the advanced age of 82 years.

Mrs. Harriet Kennedy died at the residence of her son-in-law, Dr. Lambert, at Windsor, on Sunday evening, at the advanced age of 82 years.

Daniel Hay, the young son of a Sarnia farmer, was fined \$5 and costs in Chatham police court for disturbing a religious meeting in the township.

It is announced that when the summer time comes into effect on the M. C. R. in May, that east-bound express No. 36, will be stopped at Ridgeway station.

At the Chatham police court, Angus Penfather pleaded guilty to a charge of allowing the throwing of dice on his premises, and was fined \$20 and costs, or 24 in all.

The St. Thomas City Council decided to strike a tax rate of 15 mills on the dollar, which still leaves a deficit of \$70 on the estimated expenditure. This is an increase of half a mill over last year.

James, the youngest son of James Ferguson, Thamesville, died on Saturday after a brief illness of six days. Deceased was a bright boy of 12 years, a clever student, and a general favorite with his schoolmates.

The John McLeod farm, East Nisour, was sold last week for \$9,200 to Messrs. H. Filmore and J. McLeod. This farm consists of 280 acres, adjoining the village of Thamesford, known as the Eleanor McCarthy farm.

By a law passed on Monday evening it was decided that the curfew bell be rung in Palmerston at 8:15 p.m., and that all children under 14 years of age be accompanied by guardians, be compelled to repair to their homes by 8:30.

Hog cholera has again broken out in the southern part of Essex county. On Saturday Dr. McEachern, of Windsor, paid a visit to the farm of Solomon Wiley, near Kingsville, and after an inspection declared that the herd of 90 hogs was suffering from cholera. He ordered them to be slaughtered and buried, and the premises disinfected. The inspector says he will recommend to the Government that every hog in the southern part of the county be slaughtered, as that will be the only sure way to stamp out the disease.

Inspection of Factories

And the Regulation of Shops and Stores.

A Summary of the Legislation in This Respect—Progressive and Advanced.

Toronto Globe.

The inspection of factories has been carried on for several years in the direction of the Provincial Government. The work done along this line has been of incalculable benefit to the great body of employees and has met with hearty support and co-operation on the part of the majority of manufacturers. For some time, however, it has been felt that there was need for the enforcing of similar inspection in connection with shops and stores where women and children are employed.

In 1888 a beginning was made in legislation under what is known as the Shops Regulation Act. The sum and substance of that enactment was, first, that municipal councils were given power to pass bylaws in regard to the time of closing shops; and, second, the number of hours for employing young persons was limited to 14, including meal times, in any one week.

In 1892 an amendment was made. Municipal councils were authorized and instructed to appoint inspectors for the purpose of inspecting shops and stores where women and children are employed, and all such places of business were required to provide all necessary sanitary accommodations.

In 1895 provision was made for the appointment of such inspectors by the Lieutenant-Governor in council in case the municipal council refused to act on a petition of 10 electors.

In the session just closed legislation was introduced by Mr. Dryden, Minister of Agriculture, to those departments of the government, to be consolidated and making many important amendments. Such amendments will be found to be progressive and advanced, and will doubtless be welcomed as a great boon to the young girls who live in the shops and stores of this province. The main provisions are as follows:

The act applies to all places of sale and manufacture to which the factories act does not apply. Such places as Chinese laundries, that are not inspected by the factories inspectors, also come under its provisions. No child under 10 years of age shall be employed in any shop. The working hours for every child, as stated above, are only from 7 in the morning to 6 in the evening, with an additional three hours on Saturday evening if required. Every shop must be provided with seats for female employees, and in no way must their right to use these when not engaged in work be interfered with in any manner. Eating rooms for employees shall be provided free of all charges, and the employer shall be responsible for the cleanliness of the same. Every shop must be kept in a clean and sanitary condition, and all conditions of the premises shall be entirely separate from those provided for male employees. All shops over two stories high must have fire escapes from the public, especially of the women who compose the great body of purchasers and who doubtless appreciate the safety of their children. The enforcement of this act should be backed up by a hearty approval on the part of the public, especially of the women who go shopping.

Norwood Village Suffers to the Extent of \$100,000.

The Place Without Fire Protection—Big Shingle Blaze at Deseronto.

Hastings, Ont., April 21.—At 4:50 a.m. fire broke out at Norwood, behind Vasson's grocery store, which quickly spread to adjoining buildings. A telegram was dispatched for an engine to Peterboro, Norwood having no fire protection, but it did not arrive until 6:50, when the fire had done its work.

The losers are: E. Scott, book store; Tucker Bros., grocery and bakery; J. B. Pearce, general store, the postoffice; Pearce's block, T. Hendren, carriage shop; J. O'Reilly, implements and bugles; F. Vasson, grocery; Miss Stephenson, millinery store; G. Duffield, jeweler; W. B. Roxburgh, office; a vacant store belonging to W. B. Roxburgh; R. Stewart, tin shop; J. Stewart, drug store; Water & Sons, general store, and adjoining store; G. Sheehy, law office, and Oddfellows' hall.

With the exception of Pearce's, Tucker's and Minkler's blocks, the other buildings were owned by W. E. Roxburgh. The G. N. W. telephone office, which was Stewart's drug store, was also burned.

Total loss about \$100,000, with \$40,000 insurance. J. B. Pearce, \$4,000. The Brennah House, across the street, was badly scorched, and all the windows on the opposite side were broken by the heat. R. Stewart, the druggist, and also Mr. Stewart, the hardware dealer, lost considerable damage to the stock. The fire was confined to the shingle dock.
