SATURDAY, JUNE 12.

BREAKFAST—Pineapple, Rice, with sugar and cream. Ham balls. Radishes. Breakfast rolls. Tea.

LUNCHEON—Brown bread and butter. Egg salad. Strawberry shortcake. Iced Tea.

DINNER—Cream of asparagus soup. Mutton chops, with tomato sauce. Potato soufflé. Young onions. Banana pudding. Lemonade.

Cut out these recipes and paste them in a scrap-book.

Ham Balls—Chop fine pieces of cold cooked ham. Add four tablespoons of stale bread crumbs to one-half cup of milk, stir and cook until thick, add rolls of two eggs, take from the fire and add one cup of chopped ham, one-half teaspoon of pepper and one teaspoon of chopped parsley; mix and stand away to cool (may be prepared the day before). When cold form into balls, dip into the beaten whites of the eggs, then in bread crumbs and fry in smoking-hot fat. Serve very hot and garnish with sprigs of parsley.

Breakfast Rolls—Two quarts of sifted flour, one pint of milk, two tablespoons butter or lard, one tablespoon sugar, one teaspoonful salt, half a cake compressed yeast. Put the flour into a bread pan, pour into it the milk, add the butter, salt and sugar and knead and let rise over night; yeast, knead and carefully shape into the desired size by rolling between the hands, but do not knead them. Set in a warm place and they will quickly rise ready for baking.

Egg Salad—Eight hard-boiled eggs, four crackers rolled fine, one-half cup vinegar, one teaspoon each of mustard, celery seed and salt, one tablespoonful of pepper and one tablespoonful of butter. Separate eggs and chop fine each part, beat the vinegar with the butter and pour over the eggs; then add crackers and spices. Mix lightly and garnish with lettuce.

Potato Soufflé—Steam six large potatoes; when done peel and mash; add a tablespoonful of butter, half a pint of hot milk, one egg, salt and pepper, and a saucy of white pepper; beat until very light and perfectly smooth. Froth the white of an egg, stir it gently in with the potatoes, beat on a dish and set in a quick oven to brown.

Banana Pudding—Put one pint of cream over the fire in a custard kettle. Beat two eggs with three-fourths of the cupful of sugar into which has been stirred this mixture into the boiling milk, and when it thickens remove from fire and add half a lemon. Cut the bananas in thin slices and line a dish with the slices. Cover the cake with a cupful of the custard. Then add another layer of cake and banana, and over all pour the remainder of the custard. Set on ice and let get very cold. Just before serving cover with a cupful of whipped cream.

BIG TROLLEY RIDE
The World's Record Broken — 58 Cars in Line.

Detroit, June 11.—The Mystic Shriners, who have been holding their annual meeting here, wound up their business and jubilation on Wednesday night with a grand procession in the streets and a river parade. One incident was a trolley party—the biggest ever seen in the world. There were 53 open cars in line, reaching from Congress to the ferry dock, and gaily decorated with flags, and the start was made there were 2,350 Shriners and their wives on board. The long procession moved up Woodward avenue, amid cheers and the blowing of horns, turned at the railroad crossing, came back down Woodward avenue to Jefferson avenue, and out Jefferson to waterworks park, where the Shriners visited the pumping station. Then they were given a boat ride back to the city. The immense excursion was handled without the slightest hitch, and in such a clever way as not to interfere with the ordinary street car traffic.

A BRIDGE AT KING STREET.

Board of Works Recommend a 16-Foot One-It Will Divert Traffic.

A special meeting of the sewerage committee, Aid. Parnell presiding, was held after the board of works meeting last night.

The King street bridge was the principal item of business. The city engineer reported that if it was the intention to divert traffic from York and Becher streets, the more expensive bridge would be the better. He thought a bridge on King street would have that effect, as it was free from street car tracks, and had an easier grade than Westminster bridge.

Mr. Law, of the Peterboro Bridge Company, happened at the present, and said the bridge should not be less than fourteen feet wide on account of the new pressure. A sixteen foot bridge would be better.

It was unanimously decided to accept the Peterboro Company's tender for a sixteen foot bridge, to cost \$6,020, the company to provide for carrying the sewer pipe over it free of charge.

Originally they asked 50 cents a foot, or \$325 for doing this. The bridge will cost for a sixteen foot bridge, and be in handsome up-to-date style. The cost is \$1,800 under the estimate. No doubt it will be very largely patronized by farmers and others owing to the absence of the street car tracks.

Want Asphalt Sidewalks.

The Board of Works Will Recommend Them.

Ratepayers Can Choose Asphalt or Artificial Stone—More Macadam for Dufferin Avenue.

The board of works last night took a step in the direction of encouraging more permanent street improvements.

City Engineer Graydon recommended the acceptance of the following tenders for sidewalks: The Silica Barytic Company, artificial stone, at 12 1/2 cents per foot; P. L. Marden & Co., artificial stone at 13 1/2 cents, and the Barker Asphalt Company for asphalt sidewalks at 14 cents per square foot. Each of the companies guaranteed its sidewalk for five years.

The committee accepted the engineer's recommendation. Those who petition for the walks may choose their own material, but where no special walk is petitioned for the committee will recommend the asphalt.

The petition of Samuel Harris and others for a macadam pavement on Dufferin avenue, between Waterloo and Cartwright streets, was reported as sufficiently signed, and will be granted.

About 25 cords of gravel will be delivered at Queen's Park for improvements.

The Street Railway Company indicated their willingness to lower the track on Wellington street to the street level for \$500, or the actual cost of the work. This did not meet with unanimous approval, and was laid over for consideration.

Francis street ratepayers asked for a sidewalk on the north side of the street. Referred to member of the ward and engineer.

R. Parsons asked for a position as sewer inspector. Laid over.

Ald. Parnell (chairman), Mayor Little, Ald. Carrothers, Ald. Johnston, Ald. Nutkins, Ald. O'Meara, Ald. Cooper, Engineers Graydon, Ironbridge and Ashbridge, and Secretary Bell were present.
