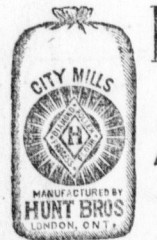

FINE, NOT MUCH CHANGE.

Toronto, Ont., Sept. 7—11 p.m.—A storm, apparently of importance, is to-night situated in the Gulf of Mexico, and another comparatively deep disturbance covers the Northwest Territories. Showers and thunder storms have occurred locally to-day in the lower lake region and more generally along the St. Lawrence Valley. In the Northwest the weather has continued very fine.

Minimum and maximum temperatures: Calgary, 48°—82°; Swift Current, 50°—96°; Winnipeg, 44°—80°; Toronto, 56°—71°; Montreal, 56°—58°; Quebec, 42°—52°; Halifax, 42°—60°.

THIS DAY IN HISTORY.

September 8.

10—Jerusalem was taken by
the Romans; Josephus says
1,100,000 Jews perished, and
Tacitus says 600,000, but the
number could not possibly
have exceeded 300,000.

1237—Thomas, duke of Glou-
cester, seventh son of Ed-
ward III, was foolishly mur-
dered by order of his neph-
ew, Richard II.

1474—Aristotle, poet, born near
Modena; died 1523.

1509—Amy Robsart, wife of the Earl of Leicester,
was murdered by his order.

1544—Francis Quarles, the leading poet just
preceding Dryden, died.

1620—The Princess Elizabeth died in Caris-
brooke castle, largely of grief for her father,
Charles I, born 1593.

1628—General George Crook born at Dayton,
O.; died 1891.

1849—William Pitt Fessenden, statesman, died
at Portland, Me.; born 1806.

1860—Beginning of the great strike of dock la-
borers and others at Southampton, Eng-
land; much rioting and destruction follow-
ed.

1891—The City of New York steamer, crossed
from Queenstown in 5 days, 22 hours and 50
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one large enough was put down. A great
deal of talking was done on both
sides and the whole matter was left
to the assessment commissioner to arbitrate.
John Young, liveryman, sent in a claim for
damages done to a buggy at the corner of
Fall Mall and Wellington streets on Mon-
day last. The letter was referred to the
engineer. The pay sheet amounted to
\$288.22. Those present were: Ald. Garraitt
(chairman), the mayor, Draney, Shaw,
Thos. Jones, Cos. Engineer Graydon, Com-
missioner Owens and Secretary Bell.

Western Fair Directors.

The directors of the Western Fair As-
sociation met yesterday afternoon. Capt.
Porte, president; Thos. A. Browne, sec-
retary; and Messrs. Geo. Taylor, A. M.
Smart, J. S. Parker, D. G. McKenzie, Col.
Lewis, Ald. Pritchett, Chas. Treblecock,
Wm. Yates, J. Hook, John Kennedy and
Rowat were present.

The secretary reported that there was no
Judge for Holsteins and Ayrshires. John
Corrie, of Ingersoll, will be asked to fill the
vacancy. Mr. Higby, on behalf of the city
council, asked what would be charged
them to enter the grounds with passengers.
