THE CAMPAIGN

Premier Ross to Address a Num-
ber of Meetings in the West—
Sir Richard Cartwright to Visit
Strathroy.

Hon. Geo. W. Ross, premier of On-
tario, will speak at Harrow on Nov. 3,
in the afternoon, and in the evening of
the same day at Kingsville. He will
also speak at meetings in West Mid-
dlesex on Oct. 31 and Nov. 1 and 2.

J. M. McEvoy, barrister, city, will
speak at meetings in the interest of
D. A. Gordon, the Liberal candidate
for Bothwell, on Monday and Tues-
day evenings of next week.

T. H. Purdon, Q.C., city, will ad-
dress a meeting of electors in Bornish,
tonight, in the interests of the Liberal
candidate for North Middlesex, Mr. V.
Ratz.

Liberal committee rooms for the
north end of No. 2 ward have been
opened at 725 Richmond street, near
Piccadilly.

Sir Richard Cartwright, Minister of
Trade and Commerce, will address a
meeting in the interests of W. S. Cal-
vert, M. P., at Strathroy, on Oct. 24.

W. Ross will deliver an address at Pe-
trolia.

T. H. Purdon, Q. C., will speak at

MR. T. BEATTIE

Again Nominated by the Conser-
vatives of London

To Oppose Mr. C. S. Hyman in
the Coming Contest.

Well Attended Convention in the Lon-
don Opera House—Speeches by the
Candidate and Other Prominent
Conservatives.

At a mass meeting of London Con-
servatives, held last night in the Lon-
don Opera House, the late member,
Major Beattie, was chosen to contest
the riding against Mr. C. S. Hyman,
the Liberal candidate. When the
meeting was called to order at 8:30 by
Chairman Adam Beck, the ground floor
of the opera house was about three-
quarters full. As the night progressed
the place filled, till the ground floor
and one gallery were comfortably filled.
The platform was occupied by a
number of prominent members of the
party, and above their heads hung a
banner—same banner which did duty
in the Princess Rink meeting four
years ago—bearing the inscription
"Vote for Beattie and eight hours a
day labor. Our candidate, a loyal sol-
dier and citizen, and a rebel."

Chairman Adam Beck, in opening
the meeting, referred to some of the
speakers at the recent Liberal conven-
tion, contrasting the statement of one
speaker that they must win at any
price with another who pleaded for an
honest election. Mr. Beck said that
there were at present in the city the
same men who had worked the ma-
chine for the Liberals at previous
elections, and the Liberal leaders were
responsible for their presence. Speak-
ing of Col. Leys, Mr. Beck said that
at the Waterloo election trial one of
the witnesses, who admitted corrupt
practices on behalf of the Liberal
candidate, also admitted that he was
sent there, and his expenses paid by Col.
Leys, M.P. Mr. Beck took excep-
tion to Sir Wilfrid Laurier's denial of
connection with the offering of a son-
atorship to Mr. H. H. Cook on pay-
ment of \$10,000, saying that he believed
Sir Wilfrid was responsible for it, as
he was also responsible for the opposi-
tion to the sending of the Liberal
contingents. The speaker said the Lib-
erals were claiming credit for the good
times. The Conservatives did not deny
there were good times, but they be-
lieved in giving the credit where it
was due, to Sir John Macdonald's fi-
nancial policy. Mr. Beck urged his
hearers to stand united, and they
would win the contest.

Richard Bayly, Q. C., then rose and
proposed the nomination of Mr. Thos.
Beattie as Conservative candidate in
the coming contest. At the mention
of Mr. Beattie's name the audience
cheered heartily. Mr. Bayly referred
to Mr. Beattie's record as a calm, firm
and determined representative. The
platform on which he stood, said Mr.
Bayly, was first, Canada as an In-
divisible part of the empire, one and
undivided, and second, protection for
Canadian industries, as inaugurated
by the Conservative party in 1878. Con-
trasted with this was the Reform pol-
icy, which consisted in getting office
by hook or crook and retaining it by
any means. Mr. Bayly then read over
Mr. H. H. Cook's charges against the
government, and said that Sir Wilfrid
Laurier had refused to deal with them
in his Massey Hall speech, in Toronto,
on Tuesday night.

Mr. John Forrestal, in seconding the
nomination, said that this was a Con-
servative city and that a Liberal mem-

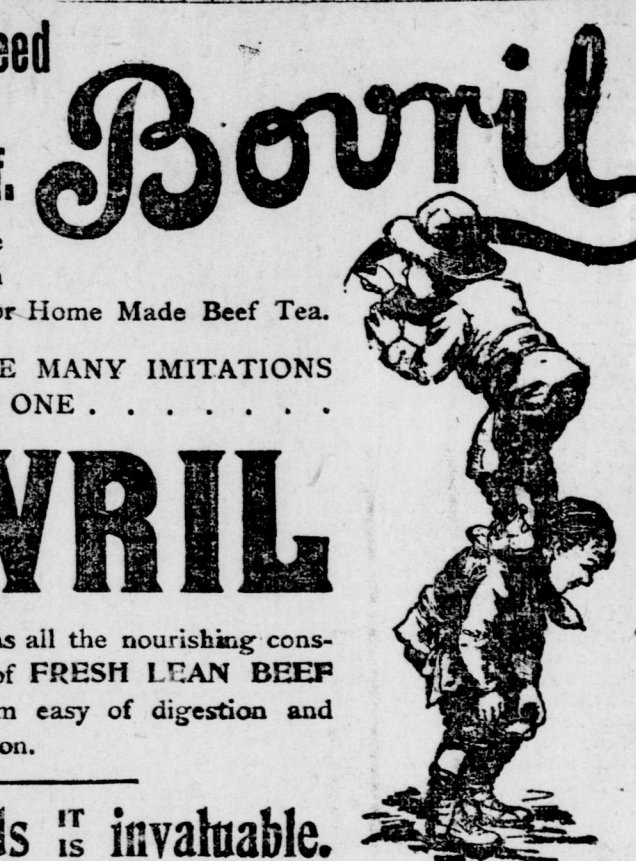

her had never been fairly returned.
Mr. Forrestal recalled the fact that
in 1893 to 1898, when panic reigned in
the United States, Canada was unaf-
fected because the night men were in
the right places, and those men were
going back into the right place, he
said.

Mr. Beck then called for other nom-
inations, but none were forthcoming,
and by a standing vote Mr. Beattie
was declared the unanimous choice of
the meeting. This was followed by
more cheers and the singing of "He's
a Jolly Good Fellow."

Mr. Beattie on rising said that he
had tried to represent his constitu-
ent to the best of his ability. Referring
to remarks made at the Liberal
convention, Mr. Beattie charged Mr.
Hume Cronyn with using personalities
directed against him, by saying that it
did not lie in his (Mr. Beattie's)
mouth to criticize Sir Wilfrid Laurier.
Mr. Beattie considered that he had a
perfect right to criticize Sir Wilfrid
when he considered it needful. Mr.
Beattie also charged Mr. T. H. Purdon,
Q. C., in making a false statement to
the effect that Mr. Beattie had stolen
the election, and clinched it by per-
jury. Mr. Beattie said he had won his
election fairly, and would win the
coming contest in the same manner. He
had fought the protest against him in
the courts, and out of about 249 charges,
not one had been proved against him.
