THE BOYS LIKE BADEN-POWELL

He Influenced 100,000 of Them to Stop Cigarette-Smoking.

Lord Rosslyn Snubbed and Winston Churchill in Disfavor.

Revival of a Zola Drama—Splendid Welcome to Gen. Buller-Comment on Sir Charles Tupper's Retirement.

BOYS LIKE BADEN-POWELL. London, Nov. 12.-Major-General Powell's extraordinary popularity among English boys is being utilized for an undoubtedly beneficent object. Baden-Powell never smoked. A league has been formed for boys from 12 to 18 years to sign a pledge to abstain from smoking for twelve months. A Total Failure of Crops in That Secroll containing 100,000 signatures will he given to Baden-Powell as a Christmas present. The cigarette habit has been growing at an appalling rate among English schoolboys. Rigorous measures are advocated by many headmasters to stop it.

CHURCHILL IN DISFAVOR. Lord Rosslyn was openly snubbed in Hyde. Park the other day for the charge of repeating unjust reports about the officers of the 10th Hussars, and a similar punishment is said to be in store for Winston Churchill for playing the part of a cad in the escape from Pretoria.

Churchill, in his book and lectures, makes himself out a hero of the first water. The true story, however, paints the child member of parliament in enthrely different colors. Two other war correspondents had preceded Churchill to the Pretoria jail, and they had carefully worked out a plan of escape be-fore he arrived. He was generously admitted into the secret, and on the night previous to the one set for the break, Churchill employed his companions' ruse for his own escape and left them in the lurch. This betrayal of friendship has long rankled in the breasts not only of the two corre-spondents concerned, but in those of many of the officers who were prisoners. They now propose to administer a proper punishment.

HONORS FOR BULLER.

The honors paid to Gen. Buller at Southampton and Aldershot are referred to by a correspondent, as follows: Gen. Buller received today civic honwelcome at Aldershot, where all the troops were drawn up and an address of congratulation was read in the ence of the Duke of Cambridge, Lord Wolseley, Mr. Brodrick, Sir William Butler and other associates. The spirit of the occasion was well summed up by the motto displayed at the sta-"Duty done is honor won." Buller's friends has stood by him as loyally as the Natal army supported him through good and evid report, and his Devonshire neighbors will follow their example. UNDERSTANDING REACHED.

Berlin, Nov. 12.-The Cologne Gazette of Saturday has the following in regard to the understanding reached by the representatives of the powers in Pekin regarding the Chinese settlement: "Pour pariers between the envoyes in Pekin for the purpose of agreeing upon the fundamentals for peace negotiations with the Chinese plenipotentiaries proceed favorably in the whole series of important points. ors at Southampton, and a splendid An agreement has been reached between the powers particularly regarding the punishment of the main cuiprits, the mandarins and princes; also regarding the witnessing of the execution of such punishments by representatives of the powers; also regarding the principle of paying damages to the several governments for the cost of the China expeditions and for damages sustained by private persons and missions; also regarding the permanent stationing of sufficient guards for the Pekin legations; also regarding the maintenance of secure and regucommunications between Pekin and the seashore. About a number of

> powers negotiations are still pending.' INCOMPLETE ARRANGEMENT. A Washington dispatch says: If, as reported in the Cologne Gazette, the powers have reached a definite understanding in regard to China, its terms, as stated by that newspaper,omit several features which have been a source of discussion among them. Probably the most important of these is the proposition to abolish the cumbersome office of the Tsung Li Yamen, or board of foreign affairs, and place the duties of that body under the supervision of person. The impression prevails that if an agreement has been reached. it is incomplete, only partial.

TOO HUMILIATING. The Roma Tribuna publishes the following from its Pekin correspondent: Li Hung Chang and Prince Ching have informed me that the demands of the powers for the punishment of Prince Tuan and the withdraway from power of the empress are too humiliating to be accepted by the Chinese. Pekin, Nov. 9-Via Shanghai, Nov.

10.-Li Hung Chang has received a note from Emperor Kwang Su de clining to accede to the demand for the punishment of Tung Fu Hsiang, and consenting only to the banishment of Yu Hsien. The note has not yet been formally communicated to the ministers.

EFFECT OF EXECUTIONS.

Pekin, Nov. 12 .- A profound impression was produced upon the natives at Pao Ting Fu by the execution there of three officials—Tien Yang, provincial treasurer; Gen. Wei Shun Kong and Col. Kiu-who were condemned by the international court-martial as among those responsible for the massacre there. They were beheaded, and their heads were exposed on poles for a day before burial.
