That market was given a solar plexus blow by the government crop report, which was much more favorable than expected, and closed at a decline of 1½c. Wheat closed ¼c lower, and oats declined ½c. Provisions closed 5c to 10c lower. Northwest receipts were 281 cars, against 227 last week and 228 a year ago. Chicago receipts were 230 cars, 24 of contract grade. Aggregate primary receipts were 1,027,000 bu., compared with 583,000 bu. a year ago. This year undoubtedly influenced some selling. Seaboard clearance of wheat and flour were equal to 427,000 bu. The visible supply was expected to increase 1,200,000. Cars on Monday: Wheat, 290; corn, 180; oats, 500; hogs, 30,000 head.

A TERRIBLE MISTAKE MADE

Russian Artillery Open Fire on American Troops.

Allies Advanced Twelve Miles Toward Peking on Monday—Head of the Missionary Board Killed.

New York, Aug. 13.—The Evening World today has a dispatch, dated Che Foo, Aug. 9, signed by Frederick Palmer, telling of a terrible mistake at the taking of Yang Tsun. The dispatch says:

Russian artillery opened fire on the American troops. Before the mistake was discovered many American soldiers had been killed or wounded by the Russian shells. Part of the casualties to the 14th Infantry was the result of the Russian fire.

As the Chinese fled, the 14th Regiment entered and occupied one of the Chinese positions. A Russian battery some distance off did not notice the movement. It opened fire on the position and planted shells among the American troops. The Russians were quickly notified and ceased their fire. Americans captured the Chinese works. Their casualties are estimated at 70 altogether. Most of these are in the 14th Infantry.

The long march and the heat played havoc with the troops, continues the correspondent. Forty per cent of the 9th Regiment were completely exhausted, as the result of the march and the fighting that followed.

The allied force is resting at Yang Tsun for two or three days. Then it is to be a rush forward on Peking.

The Chinese are demoralized by their defeats and no rest or chance to recover from their demoralization is to be given them by the allied troops.

THE ADVANCE ON PEKING.

Tien Tsin, Monday, Aug. 6.—via Shanghai, Aug. 12.—The army advanced 12 miles today.

Two reliable couriers who left Peking Aug. 1, arrived today at Tien Tsin. They say that the Express messenger had fed the foreigners for a few days. The former viceroy of Shantung, who is bitterly anti-foreign, arrived with his troops, according to these couriers, and planted two battalions on the road near the city. The enemy began shelling and opened a fierce rifle fire, which was kept up for two days.

The head of the missionary board, with a party, while trying to get provisions, was killed.

The allies took Yang Tsun today. They suffered heavily. The American loss was small.

New York, Aug. 13.—Under copyright head, the Evening World today has a dispatch from Frederick Palmer, dated Che Foo, Aug. 10, which says that a general advance of the relief column began on the morning of Aug. 8, and adds that the allied forces will probably reach Peking in seven days.

The Chinese defeated at Yang Tsun have retreated to Peking, says the dispatch.

SIX WILL REMAIN A MEMORIAL

Remainder of the Canadian Presbyterian Missionaries in China Are on Their Way Home.

Toronto, Aug. 13.—The Rev. Dr. Warden received the following cable from Dr. McClure, Shanghai: "Leslies, Macdonalds, Mrs. McClure, San Francisco, 18th; Goforths, Mr. Simmons, Misses McIntosh, Dow, Pyke, San Francisco, 28th; Menzies, Mackenzies, Vancouver, 29th August."

When the Foreign Mission Committee met ten days ago they left it with the staff of missionaries in China to decide upon the course to be adopted, suggesting that all should return to Canada, with the exception of three male missionaries, who should remain in the East to carry out the work of the committee. The others who remain in the East are Dr. McClure, Revs. R. A. Mitchell, D. MacClure, J. Griffith, T. C. Hood and Miss Dr. Wallace.

RAILWAY WRECKS

Two Men Killed and Two Badly Injured in One Accident—Southern Pacific Train Demolished.

Lake Charles, La., Aug. 13.—Passenger train No. 9, on the Southern Pacific was wrecked last evening. The train was going over the trestle over the La Casine Bayou, at full speed, when the tender jumped the track and broke loose from the engine. The engine went on, and the nine coaches were thrown in every direction. The cars were nearly all thrown into the mud and water of La Casine Bayou, and the trestle was completely demolished. On board the train were about 130 people, and the fact that only one, a boy, was killed, is beyond explanation. Mrs. M. L. Chattin, the boy's mother, was seriously hurt on the head.

JUMPED THE TRACK.

Wheeling, W. Va., Aug. 13.—Last night, at 7 o'clock, a Deep Run car, on the Erie Railroad, a south-bound coal train jumped the track over a steep embankment. Two men were killed, and two others badly injured. Engineer Mike McCreary, of Norfolk, was jumping the car, and his head, fracturing his skull. He died three hours later. An unknown man boarded the train at Warrenton and was killed. Fireman G. E. Turner, of Steubenville, jumped and received two bad cuts at the neck and shoulder. His condition is serious. Israel Wolfe, of Steubenville, front brakeman, jumped, and received internal injuries.

details as to the form this memorial will take, the site suggested, the method of raising funds, and other matters on which it is yet impossible to dilate. If I seem unnecessarily vague now, I can but plead the great importance— as it appears to me—of not starting so large a project with any hard and fast ideas, and of not saddling a committee with any stereotyped recommendations that might in some cases—well, at a large section of the public sympathy. But in the interval, before any definite conclusions have been arrived at, apart from the general acquiescence of a large and representative body in the fact of a future memorial to be built in London, I shall be very glad of any suggestions in the shape either of warning or advice.

I think I need hardly say more to commend the attention of English readers to the broad principle which the committee has been organized to support, and I look forward to the day when, under the sanction and authority of their names, a definite and fairly decided scheme can be brought forward after the close of the war. A widespread expression of sympathy has been obtained for the broad, general principle that the names of all our dead should be in some way permanently preserved in an appropriate building in London, whether they were British born, or whether they came from the colonies, whose assistance in this campaign has marked the birth of a coherent and united empire, in which every part is ready to share in the common responsibility, and to bear the common burden. In order to give this feeling a practical form a large number of gentlemen have signified their willingness to become members of what may be called the first general committee, a body that is drawn from a very wide area, and will carry authority wherever the English tongue is spoken. Its numbers are not yet quite completed, but it is already fully representative of the present cabinet, of both government and opposition in the Upper and Lower Houses of Parliament, of every branch of religious thought, of the privy council, of the House of Lords, lieutenant of counties, of the London county council, of art and letters, of the learned societies, and of every colony under the British flag.

The objects of this committee have already been received with approval in the highest quarters, and at the proper time, probably within a few days after active military operations in South Africa have ceased, I shall be at liberty to ask you to publish the names of its members for the information of the public. Later on, too, after the first general meeting has enabled us to distinguish the plan most likely to commend itself both in the colonies and at home, I shall hope to lay before you

MT. STEPHEN'S SUMMIT

The Giant of the Canadian Rockies Asconded by an American Lady.

The ascent of Mount Stephen, the giant of the Rockies, was recently made by a Winnipeg gentleman, who was accompanied by a couple of Swiss guides whom the Canadian Pacific Railway Company has stationed at several points along the line through the mountains. The height of Mount Stephen is 8,900 feet by the railway track.

They started at 5:45 in the morning and reached the summit at 12:30. The journey was hazardous enough to be interesting to the most daring, and tollsome enough to prevent the great majority of tourists from accomplishing it. In places the perpendicular ascent is only possible by means of ropes. On the summit the Winnipeg gentleman attached his handkerchief to a pole which was already there, having been put in position some four or five years ago, by an Englishman, who so far as known was the first man to ascend Mount Stephen. It took him three days to go and return, of course, without a guide. While at the summit he attached a Union Jack to the pole. Last year, Mr. Ferrier, from the Mount Stephen House, ascended to the summit, and brought back with him a shred of that was left of the Union Jack. So far as is known, those are the only people who had previously reached the summit. He and his party left the summit at 2 p.m. and reached the Mount Stephen House about 7. The day after he left the house an American gentleman and his sister, with two guides, were going to endeavor to reach the summit. It was a great feat for a lady to undertake, but she accomplished it successfully. They had a beautiful day and took several views. The lady stood the trip excellently well, and certainly performed a great feat.
