THE ONTARIO LEGISLATURE

More Veterans Included in the Bill Appropriating Land Grants to Soldiers.

Toronto, March 12 .- Very ilttle busiless was transacted in the legislature yesterday, there being barely a quorum of members present. The budget debate will be resumed today by Mr. Beatty (Leeds), and it is likely that the attorney-general will follow him. In any event it is intended to finish the debate at today's sitting. Mr. Whitney will close for the opposi-tion, and the premier will deliver the last address for the government.

BILLS INTRODUCED. The following bills were introduced: Dr. Pyne, providing that wherever the word "lunatic or lunatics" appear in the report of proceedings, orders in council, etc., the words "person or persons of unsound mind" be substituted; and providing for the changing of the words "lunatic asylums" in reports or bills to "hospitals for the insane." Mr. Carnegie (Victoria), to amend the assessment act by providing that young men coming of age within four months of the date fixed for the final return of the roll shall be added to the

They suggest as the basis of taxation the earning capacity of the company. The corporations are bringing strong influences to bear on the government to refrain from touching the assessment act this session.

TWO-YEAR MAYORALTY TERM. Mr. Carscallen presented a petition from the city council of Hamilton asking among other things that in cities of 15,000 population and over the mayoralty term shall be two years; that the city council shall have power to revise the estimates of other bodies not elected by the ratepayers; and that the council be also empowered to inspect and regulate wires and apparatus for the transmission of electricity for light

Absence of Stormbound Members Makes a Quiet Sitting of the House -A Military Resolution.

Ottawa, March 11.—The House was poorly attended today, as many members were stormbound at their homes, and after a quiet afternoon the house rose at 6 o'clock.

The bill respecting the Supreme Court of the Independent Order of Foresters was passed through committee and read a third time.

In answer to Mr. Gourley the premier stated that there are no negotiations now pending between Canada and Newfoundland with a view of the latter province becoming a member of this confederation; and, further, that the time did not seem to be austricine for time did not seem to be auspicious for the opening of such negotiations.

No special inquiry had been made as to the proportion of lapses, but the return showed that the proportion of lapses was large.
