Democratic Senators look upon the act from a twofold point of view, some taking the ground that it shows Mr. Cleveland is against annexation or American domination of any soil in the Hawaiian Islands, while others hold that he will send in another treaty more to his liking. It is understood that the reason for the withdrawal of the treaty by President Cleveland is because he is opposed to the treaty in its present form.

ANOTHER BIG COMBINE.

This Time It Is in the Lumber Business.

Immense Canadian Tracts Purchased by Gen. Alger, of Michigan-A Capital of \$10,000,000.

TORONTO, March 9 .- A big lumber com-TORONTO, March 9.—A big lumber combine is in process of formation which will include some of the heaviest operators in Michigan and Canada. They have been gathering in Toronto for several days past. Options have been secured on limits covering several thousand square miles and also on some of the largest mills in the Province. In Quebec, Ex-Governor Alger, of Michigan, and his associates have purchased a tract nearly 1,200 miles square, and have under consideration the purchase of another tract of about the same and have under consideration the purchase of another tract of about the same area on the St. Maurice River and Upper Ottawa River. Saginaw men who are now in Toronto are awaiting reports from their land-lookers, which will enable them to decide whether to close up the deal of \$2,000,000 worth of limits on the north shore of Lake Huron. The details, such as have been agreed on, provide for strict maintenance of prices, of limitation of the yearly cut and the appointment of purchasing and selling agents. The working capital of the concern will be in the neighborhood of \$10,000,000.

WHITES AND REDS.

Open Warfare Between Them in Mon-tana-First Bloodshed.

Copen Warfare Between Them in Montana—First Bloodshed.

LAUREL, Mont., March 9.—Open warfare has broken out between the settlers on the newly-opened portion of the Crow reservavation and the Indians, and the wildest excitement exists at the new town of Wilsey and the country round about. Ranchmen around Wilsey are moving their wives and children to places of safety and preparing to defend their claims with their lives if necessary. The first bloodshed occurred this morning, Little Face, a Crow Indian, being killed. The Indians who have just been allotted lands in severalty, had become angered at the encroachments of the whites, and undertook to drive off a settler named Henderson. On Monday they drove Henderson away, but he rereturned with a couple of friends all armed. The Indians gathered in a clump of timber and sent Little Face forward. He told Henderson if he remained on the tract of land which he had homesteaded another 24 hours he would be scalped and his body fed to the crows. He then whistled and his companions began to pour out of the woods, he at the same time reaching for his gun, which he had setagainst a tree. He was not quick enough, however, as Henderson shot him through the heart. With a wild yell his companions disappeared at double quick into the woods. The Crows are making medicine and preparing for actual warfare. This is the first time the Crows have shown hostility to the whites.
