

A four-year guarantee was all that was given at the committee. Ald. Matthews had seen a batch of contractors twice, and he did not propose to allow himself to be panhandled by any of them. "I very much think that the guarantee was changed from four years to five after it left the committee," was the concluding statment of Ald. Matthews.
