DECIDED UPON GRANTS

Work of Augmentation Committee in This City.

Recommendations Go to General Assembly.

The Augmentation committee of the Synod of Hamilton and London, which met yesterday, concluded its session late in the afternoon. It met to arrange certain grants, which they decided upon as follows:

Bruce Presbytery—\$150 for Salem and Dobbington congregation.
Chatham Presbytery—\$50 for Blythe-wood. It was decided to place the congregation of Harrow on the augmented list.

Hamilton Presbytery—\$100 for Hagersville, \$125 for Lynedoch, \$175 for Port Colborne, \$125 for Smithville and Muir, \$100 for St. David's.

Huron Presbytery—\$100 for congregation of Grand Bend and Corbett; \$100 for congregation of Leeburn and Union, \$50 for congregation of Bayfield and Bethany; this grant to cease at the end of the ensuing year; \$50 for the congregation of Varna and Blake.

London Presbytery—\$130 for Hyde Park and Komoka congregations, \$200 for Port Stanley, \$125 for Tempo and St. John's Delaware congregations, \$75 for Appin and North York congregations.

Maitland Presbytery—\$75 to the congregation of Walton, grant to cease at the end of the ensuing year.

Paris Presbytery—\$100 to Wintham. Stratford Presbytery—\$100 for Granton, for the present year only; \$165 for Lucan.

Sarnia Presbytery—\$125 for Inwood, \$150 for Marston, \$200 for Point Edward, \$250 for Sombra.

The report embodying these recommendations will be presented to the general assembly, which meets at its meeting in Toronto next week.

TO ADOPT CHILDREN

Seven Applications Dealt With by Protestant Home Board.

The trustees of the Protestant Orphans' Home are receiving numerous applications from persons who desire to adopt children now in the home. At the regularly monthly meeting of the board held this week no less than seven applications were dealt with, and the majority of them had to be declined. The report of the visiting committee spoke in the highest praise of the home, which had been found in a very satisfactory condition at all times. Tenders for the year's supplies were also received and contracts awarded.

During February two children were admitted to the home, and two others were discharged, to be cared for by friends. The management expressed their thanks to the friends who had remembered the little ones with donations during February, among them being Rowland Hill, the Daughters of the Empire, Mr. Wardell, and the Ladies' Morning Music Club.

High Street Methodist Church burned

its mortgage last night. This church is now all paid for, the last of the debt being wiped out not very long ago and last night's entertainment was in celebration of this event, for which the members of the congregation are very thankful.

The genesis of the church was in a cottage in the south end of the city, where it was known that there was a need for a church at that time. That was in the year 1890, and Rev. G. W. Henderson, who was at that time pastor of the Wellington Street Church, had a mission started there. Inside of two years from the time that the mission was started in that little cottage, which they had rented on Emery street, the attendance had grown so much that it was necessary to find more accommodation, and it was decided to build a mission church of their own. This was done and since that time the church has prospered and the debt has been all paid off, as stated above.

This wiping off the debt was due to an appeal made a short time ago for the necessary \$200, which was heartily responded to, and the mortgage was burned at the entertainment last night by three young ladies of the congregation, Miss Nellie Hobbs, representing the finance committee; Miss Hanson, representing the Sunday school and Epworth League, and Miss Ada Tucker, representing the Ladies' Aid. The ceremony was preceded by an introduction by the pastor, Rev. A. W. Budd. Speeches were also made by Rev. R. D. Hamilton, who occupied the chair, by Revs. A. Ayres, J. Coulter and W. G. Howson.

Besides paying the debt the church has now a small surplus on hand, and the Sunday school is getting along remarkably well, all those connected with the work from the pastor down, being energetic and devoted workers.
