Chicago, Oct. 14.—The Chicago miners' relief committee has just forwarded \$3,000, making a total of \$11,000 sent thus far to support the strikers. The total of contributions received is \$11,656.

THE ERIE EARNINGS.

New York, Oct. 14.—Earnings of the Erie Railroad Company for the fiscal year ended June 30 last, as given in the annual statement just issued, amount to \$12,717,833, an increase for the year of \$3,622,365. The coal strike, which tied up the mines in May and June last, resulted in diminishing the tonnage of anthracite coal 3.8 per cent. For the year 6,003,305 tons were transported over the Erie lines to market, a decrease of 237,050 tons.

O'DELL SPEAKS UP

Both Capital and Labor Must Bend to the People's Rights

New York, Oct. 13.—Gov. Odell tonight opened the Republican State campaign in Brooklyn by making a number of speeches. In the early evening he attended a dinner given in his honor by the Union League Club, of Brooklyn, at which Senator Depew was one of the speakers.

The Governor was then driven to the Academy of Music, where he opened the Hebrew fair. After this Gov. Odell was taken to the rooms of the Brooklyn Young Men's Republican Club, and thence to the Claremont inn, where he made the principal address of the night. In this address he referred to the coal strike. He said:

"The combinations of capital which have marked the commercial progress of our country, have been accompanied by combinations of labor, but only as both pursue their business within the limits of constitutional and statutory law they are entitled to the protection of the State and the strong arm of the law. Violations, whether they be through the artificial enhancement of prices; whether they be in the direction of curtailment of production; whether they be by the interference with the rights of individual workmen, or whatever form such lawlessness may take, should be promptly met and suppressed by the power vested in the executive branches of government."

"The rights of the people are paramount. Whenever conflicts of capital and labor threaten not only the prosperity, but also the physical comfort and welfare of the people, it then becomes the duty of those who represent the commonwealth, which has given to the one a charter right for existence and to the other labor, to step in and endeavor to adjust such differences."

view, spoke most approvingly of the work. Sir John was a student and advocate of imperial federation, and was a member of the committee appointed in Montreal in 1885 to further the scheme. In the Royal Society he was a most conspicuous figure, being president and subsequently secretary for many years. He received the University honors he received in abundance. From Trinity University he received the honorary degree of LL.D. in 1885, and Queen's, in 1896; D. C. L., King's College, 1890; Doctor of Letters, Laval, 1893; and D. C. L., Bishop's College, 1895. He was secretary of the Royal Society in 1882, vice-president in 1891, president in 1892 and 1893. He was also secretary of the American Historical Association and of the Canadian Monthly. He was also vice-president of the Canadian exploration fund, honorary member of the American Society for the Study of the History of the West, and of the Royal Canadian Institute, examiner in constitutional law and sciences as well as the physical sciences of Trinity University. In 1890 he became a C. M. G. and in 1898 received the honor of knighthood, being generally known as Sir John Bourinot. He was married three times—first, in 1858, to Miss Della Hawkes; second, in 1866, to Miss Emma, and third, in 1872, to Miss Isabella, daughter of the late John Cameron, of Toronto.

Sir John was particularly known as an authority on parliamentary procedure. His "Practice and Procedure in Parliament" was most favorably reviewed in England and became a standard authority on the subject. It was also a standard authority in the Westminster Review, the Law Quarterly and the Scottish Review.

One of his more prominent works was the "Intellectual Development of Canada," a capable, elaborate and valuable treatise on the intellectual culture of the colonies and of Canada after the Confederation. He was a contributor to many leading papers, notably the London Mail, the New York World, and the Canadian Monthly. He contributed a number of papers for the Royal Canadian Institute, which attracted great attention. Among these were referring to a federation of the empire, deemed as being of such importance that it is referred to by Sir John in his "History of Our Own Times." An article in Blackwoods (a publication with few Canadian contributors), on the progress of the New Dominion, was reviewed by the Times as "the best article that has appeared on the subject in a British periodical." Other papers to which he contributed were the Westminster Review, the Law Quarterly and the Scottish Review.

MAN OF UNUSUAL ERUDITION

An Authority on Parliamentary Procedure and Had Contributed Much to Things Literary.

Ottawa, Oct. 13.—Sir John Bourinot, clerk of the House of Commons, died at 9 o'clock tonight, after a lingering illness. He was a sufferer from stomach trouble, and bore a very trying illness with fortitude. He would have been 65 years of age had he lived until the 24th inst.

Sir John Bourinot was of Huguenot descent, being a son of the late Hon. J. Bourinot, a native of Jersey, in the

Channel Islands, and a member of the Canadian Senate. He was born at Sydney, N. S., on Oct. 24, 1837. His mother was a daughter of Judge Marshall, of Nova Scotia, well known as a temperance advocate and writer on religious subjects. In early life he was a reporter on the Halifax News-Press, and afterwards was chief Hansard reporter for the Legislature of Nova Scotia. In 1858, he was appointed to the Hansard staff of the Senate, and in 1872 was appointed second assistant clerk in the House of Commons. In 1879 he became first clerk assistant, and on the 10th of December, 1890, was named chief clerk, a position which he had since filled
