Steamer and Schooner Come
in Collision.

FOUR SEAMEN WERE DROWNED

A Grand Trunk Fireman Injured at
Strathroy—Workman Fell
Forty Feet.

FIREMAN INJURED AT STRATHROY.

Strathroy, Ont., Nov. 5. — Donald Robertson, of Sarnia, fireman on the G. T. R., had his leg crushed here yesterday, while adjusting the water crane of the water tank on the tender of his engine. The doctor says there are no bones broken.

FOUR DROWNED.

Boston, Nov. 4. — The United Fruit Company's steamer, Admiral Sampson, which arrived here today, reports that she collided with the three-masted schooner, Charles E. Buck, bound from Eddyville, N. Y., for Boston, about ten miles off the Cape Cod lightship early this morning. The schooner was sunk, and Capt. Freeman Huntley, of Jonesport, Me., Mate Ulmer Huntley, and two seamen of the Buck were drowned. The mate was a son of the captain. The lost sailors were Norman Sampson, aged 35, of Sydney, C. B., and Mark Beard, aged 18, of Two Rivers, N. S. The saved were Pearl Crowley, cook, of Jonesport, Me., and Seaman Moore Cook, of Eastport, Crowley and Cook, the survivors, say that the collision occurred in a very heavy fog. The schooner's heavy cargo of cement carried her down in less than three minutes. A lifeboat from the steamer picked up the two survivors.

FELL FORTY FEET.

KILLED WHILE COUPLING CARS.

Port Arthur, Ont., Nov. 4. — R. Hanna, formerly a business man of this place, was instantly killed in the Schreiber station yards yesterday while coupling a box car and the steam shovel car. The long draw-head on the steam shovel struck Hanna's head was caught between the platform of the shovel and the box car.

FOUND DEAD IN BED.

Portage la Prairie, Man., Nov. 4. — James Oliver, an old and respected resident of the town, was found dead in bed last night. He was 75 years of age, residing alone, his wife having died several years ago.

FOUND DROWNED.

Syracuse, N. Y., Nov. 5. — The bodies of a man and a woman were found at night in the water near the city. They were strapped together. Liverpool people have identified them as a strange couple who drove through the city a few days ago.

TRAINMEN KILLED.

Marshall, Pa., Nov. 4. — In a collision last night on the Baltimore and Ohio, between fast freight west and two helper engines, Engineer Geo. D. Ingram, of Conneville, was probably killed. The train was carrying a load of steel rails.

It is reported that the C. P. R. has moved 75 per cent more grain from Winnipeg than at this time last year.

Tuesday was the last day for the filing of particulars in the Frontenac election protest, but none was entered.

The Georgia Legislature in joint session re-elected U. S. Senator Alexander S. Clay for the full term of six years.

Joseph Doyle, a machinist, 109 McGill street, Toronto, fell asleep with a knife in his bed on Saturday, and died of a wound.

The Temiskaming Railway Commissioners have ordered 175,000 ties, and have called for tenders for \$200 tons of steel rails.

The Canadian Horsebreeders' Association has been ordered to hold a horse show in Toronto in January or February next.

The returns of the Toronto cattle market for ten months this year show a total of 57,000 head over last year; more than 50 per cent.

The Ottawa Presbytery has accepted the resignation of Rev. Dr. Moore, as pastor of Bank Street Presbyterian Church. Dr. Moore is an ex-moderator of the General Assembly.

It is stated nearly 3,000 Quakers will settle in the Northwest next year. This will be chiefly through the efforts of Joseph Elkington, a wealthy Philadelphia Quaker and philanthropist.
